**September 9, 2022** – Please be advised that the following Order in Council (OIC) has been posted on the Manitoba Government website.

For full transparency, the AMM is not aware of which municipalities are being investigated or case specifics, other than what was included in the OIC. At this time, we do not know the scope or nature of the concerns raised that led to this specific OIC. As the OIC pertains to a small sampling of municipalities, we have also urged the Province and media to not paint all municipalities with the same brush as the process progresses.

The Office of the Auditor General (OAG) and Manitoba Ombudsman have previously investigated citizens' concerns related to municipal governance and financial management in individual municipalities in the past. Their reports are always reviewed, especially if recommendations pertain to strengthening municipal governance. We look forward to learning more about the scope and nature of the concerns raised that precipitated this specific OIC and whether these concerns are substantiated. The AMM will also review all of the recommendations that may result from the OAG investigation.

Lastly, as the AMM strives to promote good governance, accountability, and transparency for all of our members, we will continue to provide updates as more information becomes available.

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# MANITOBA ORDER IN COUNCIL

ORDER IN COUNCIL No.: **343/2022**

RECOMMENDED BY: **Minister  
of Finance**

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## ORDER

1. The Auditor General is requested to examine and audit the operations and the accounts of various Municipalities, including the Municipality of Westlake – Gladstone (altogether, the "Municipalities").

## AUTHORITY

*The Auditor General Act, C.C.S.M. c. A180, states:*

### **Special audit on request**

**16(1)** When requested to do so by the Lieutenant Governor in Council or the Minister of Finance, or by resolution of the Standing Committee on Public Accounts, the Auditor General may examine and audit the operations and the accounts of a government organization, recipient of public money or other person or entity that in any way receives, pays or accounts for public money. But the Auditor General is not obliged to do so if he or she is of the opinion that it would interfere with the primary responsibilities of the Auditor General.

### **Report**

**16(2)** The Auditor General must report the findings of an audit under this section to the person or body that requested the audit and to the minister responsible for any government organization concerned.

### **Report submitted to the Assembly**

**16(3)** The Auditor General may submit a report of an audit under this section to the Assembly if it is in the public interest to do so, but must allow at least 14 days for the minister responsible for the government organization and the Minister of Finance to review and comment on the report before finalizing it for submission to the Assembly.

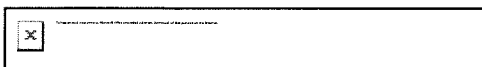
## BACKGROUND

1. The Department of Finance (the "Department") has been advised by the Department of Municipal Relations of citizens' concerns with respect to council governance, financial management, oversight and public accountability in various Municipalities, including the municipality of WestLake-Gladstone.
2. The Department has determined that a special audit of the Municipalities by the Auditor General is advisable.
3. The scope of any such special audit will be determined by the Auditor General and may include consideration of the following matters:
  - (a) whether financial and administrative provisions of Acts, regulations, policies and directives have been complied with; and,
  - (b) whether the form and content of financial information documents, including municipal and provincial oversight, is adequate and suitable.

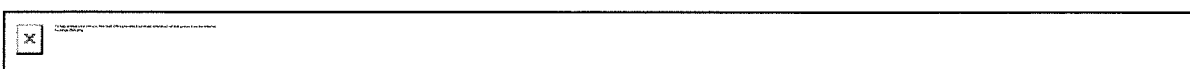

To Whom It May Concern,

As members of the Breaking Barriers Together Association, we would like to thank you for taking the time to read our letter and we would like to introduce ourselves.

We are a group of former employees of Canada's Royal Canadian Mounted Police who have formed a not-for-profit association to lobby Canadians to push for large-scale change in the operation and structure of our national police force and military.

As you are aware, both the RCMP and Canadian Military have been plagued for decades with serious, often criminal, allegations of internal misconduct and abuse. These problems are always said to be "cultural" issues that the government claims to be working on.

This type of behaviour however, was sponsored by the Government of the Day, in the 1950's - 1990s, with internal purging of employees of the Canadian Government, National Defence and the Royal Canadian Mounted Police, known as the "Purge". Hundreds of employees, from many departments were fired, interrogated, for being LGBTQ. A class action also followed in recent years as many as over 750 persons were involved.

As victims of this systemic abuse, we have joined together with the goal of letting Canadians know just how little has been done to address this issue which is pushing some officers and staff to suicide. By showing the seriousness of this issue, we believe it can become a voting issue for Canadians and that will push those in power to make the changes that have been recommended for years but have consistently been ignored.

In 2012, a group of women who had been sexually harassed, raped and abused within the RCMP came together and filed a class action law suit against the RCMP and federal government. More and more came forward with very disturbing and serious allegations. After 4 years in court, arguing for



certification of our case, the federal government offered a settlement to the victims. Over 3200 women came forward which was triple the predictions of our lawyers, who suspected it may grow to 1000.

That shows how serious the problems within the force were and continue to be. Our case ended in 2016 with a national public apology, a financial settlement of more than \$125 million and commitments to change the force. To date, absolutely nothing has been done. We hear from current victims quite often and we know that neither the 3200 victims, the national apology, the settlement paid nor the promise to do better mattered enough to the government to warrant the political will to change. Promises and recommendations have been ignored, and the abuse continues.

The vast majority of the RCMP consists of honest, hard working, ethical humans who have sworn an oath to uphold the law and serve their communities. In the Communities where the RCMP are contracted to serve, municipal employees in that detachment deserve a harassment free workplace in all aspects. If there is no recourse available to those Municipal Employees, the RCMP has failed them as well as their own employees. The municipal employees deserve as much protection as do RCMP/PSEs and Civilian Members. If anything, there is no record of voices from these employees and how they have been affected by the lack of responsibility by the RCMP. It is time that these employees be recognized as part of the change. This involves many of us, from Current Members, Civilian Employees, Public Service Employees, Municipal Employees and other support staff. From non union to union members who have been excluded from many of the lawsuits. It affects us all, families, neighbours and friends.

From our 2012 law suit, 2 other large class actions were launched. One for those who suffered systemic internal racism and another for generalized harassment and bullying which is expected to be in excess of \$1.2 billion in costs. Many officers and staff have filed their own law suits and had them settled in their favour, adding to the vast amount of Canadian taxpayer dollars being spent to pay out for RCMP misconduct.

It is interesting to note, that when these cases are filed, we (the plaintiffs/ victims) pay our legal expenses out of a portion of our settlement. The RCMP and government have every dollar of their side of the litigation paid for by the Department of Justice. They can keep cases in the courts for years at the expense of taxpayers. We need your help to change that.

In recent days, we have seen the story of sexual misconduct in Canada's hockey association. The response has been rapid with funding cuts, sponsorships halted and immediate questions from the Minister of Sport demanding answers and requesting that if those who have the power to address and change this continue to do nothing, then get out and let people who can change the situation take over. We wonder why the Minister of Public safety has never taken a similar stance in support of RCMP abuse victims. We ask questions but get no answers. That is where you can help.



The Canadian government has known of the problems in the RCMP for decades and have paid millions of dollars on numerous studies to be completed by experts and scholars. There have been at least 17 of these studies done on misconduct. EVERY SINGLE STUDY EVER COMPLETED BY THESE EXPERTS HAVE RECOMMENDED ONE THING CONSISTENTLY. THAT IS THE CREATION OF AN INDEPENDENT BODY OF INVESTIGATION AND OVERSIGHT TO DEAL WITH MISCONDUCT BECAUSE THE RCMP HAS FAILED MISERABLY TO ADDRESS THIS ISSUE ON THEIR OWN.

Breaking Barriers Together are reaching out to all of the groups and individuals that may be unaware of just how bad things are in our national police force and military and we want to see how our problem is indirectly yours also. You can make change with your help. We have a simple ask thing to ask of you.

Earlier this year, we saw the introduction of Bill C-20 which will begin the creation of independent oversight, but it's not done yet. The Bill will be revisited this fall and we want to ensure Canadians are on board to pressure the government for them to see the importance of this Bill passing.

### RE: Seeking Input on the proposed Management Plan for Greenish-white Grasshopper in Canada

Good Afternoon Association of Manitoba Municipalities- Western and Central Districts,

We are writing to let you know that Environment and Climate Change Canada is developing a **Management Plan for Greenish-white Grasshopper** (*Hypochlora alba*) in Canada, an insect listed as Special Concern under the federal *Species At Risk Act* (SARA). In Canada, the Greenish-white Grasshopper is found in southern Alberta, Saskatchewan and Manitoba where it's only host plant, the White Sagebrush (*Artemisia ludoviciana*) can be found, and which the grasshopper relies on for multiple life stages. Please see the attached Summary for more information. Please note we have cc'd the RMs within the range of the Greenish –white Grasshopper here as well.

For each species of Special Concern, Environment and Climate Change Canada must develop a Management Plan that provides information on the species and its habitat, establishes a management objective, identifies threats, and recommends broad strategies and conservation measures to address those threats and achieve the management objective.

The proposed *Management Plan for Greenish-white Grasshopper* was posted on the Species At Risk Public Registry on September 1, 2022 for a 60-day public comment period that **ends on October 13, 2022**. Following this, we will consider all comments received and work to finalize the document. **We invite your review of the content of the proposed Management Plan for Greenish-white Grasshopper during this 60-day period.** Your support will help to make this recovery document a success. # Summary of the proposed Management Plan for the GREENISH-WHITE GRASSHOPPER

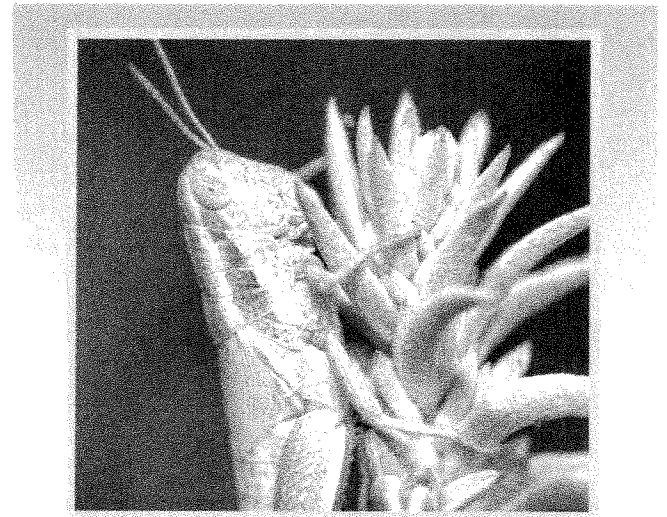
Under the *Species at Risk Act* (SARA), a management plan must be developed for each species listed as Special Concern in order to identify measures for the conservation of the species. This document highlights the key sections of the proposed management plan.

## Species Conservation Status

Greenish-white Grasshopper (*Hypochlora alba*) was listed as Special Concern under Schedule 1 of SARA in February 2018.

## Description

The Greenish-white Grasshopper is a small, distinctive, pale milky-green coloured member of the spur-throated grasshoppers, also known as the Sage Grasshopper or the Cudweed Grasshopper. It's colouration closely matches that of its host plant, White Sagebrush (*Artemisia ludoviciana*), which the species relies on for multiple life stages. The Greenish-white Grasshopper is a late-hatching species (mid-July) and females are typically larger than males.

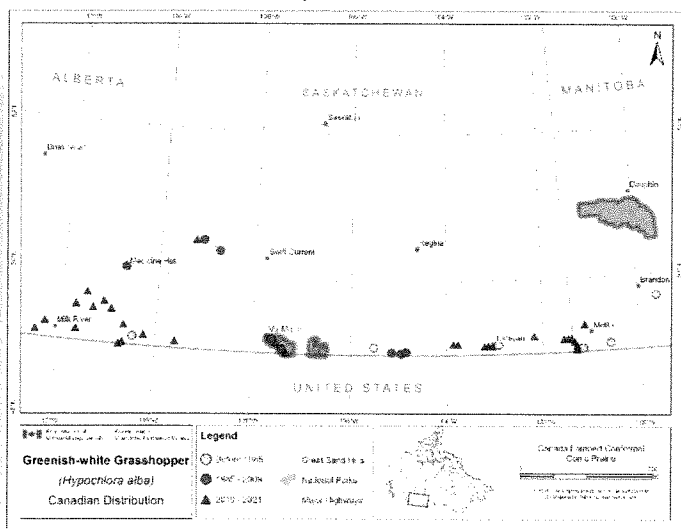


Greenish-white Grasshopper resting on White Sagebrush

## Distribution & Population

The Greenish-white Grasshopper distribution in Canada is small, being known only from southern Alberta, Saskatchewan, and Manitoba. The distribution is at the northern periphery of the species' global range. Existing records encompass 47 sites where Greenish-white Grasshoppers have been observed in Canada, including 33 from 2010 until 2021, eight from 1985-2009 and six historical sites prior to 1988.

It is difficult to estimate the population size for a species that is naturally rare and poorly studied given the currently available data. In addition, fluctuations in population size and density are natural in grasshopper populations owing to variation in weather conditions, availability and productivity of host plants, and pressures from disease and natural enemies such as predators and parasitoids.

## Habitat Needs

The Greenish-white Grasshopper is typically found in relatively undisturbed, dry mixed-grass prairie habitats such as grazed but not improved rangelands and natural grasslands. The species is associated with habitats where its primary host White Sagebrush occurs. This plant is used as food, for all life stages from hatched nymphs through to adults, as well as for shelter from the weather and from predators. The Greenish-white Grasshopper also lays eggs in the top layer of the soil near host food plants, so soils with the appropriate composition, texture and generally favourable soil conditions (e.g., moisture, topographic position) may also be important.

## Threats to the Species' Survival

The most significant limiting factors for Greenish-white Grasshopper are its reliance on a single host plant that occurs in patches of low densities, and a low dispersal ability to move among habitat patches. With a reliance on one main host plant, any threats to this host plant constitute a threat to this rare grasshopper. Several poorly understood threats have been identified for Greenish-white Grasshopper including:

- habitat loss, degradation or fragmentation from grassland conversion to cultivated crops;
- herbicide and pesticide use;
- road construction or maintenance; and
- oil and gas drilling.

Other threats that result in changes to the natural disturbance regime include enhancing forage production in pastures, or changes to grazing or fire regimes, landscape hydrology and climate.

## Management Objectives

The management objective is to maintain the distribution of the Greenish-white Grasshopper, based on records from 1985 until 2021, in Alberta, Saskatchewan and Manitoba, as well as any additional populations that are discovered or rediscovered in the future.

## Strategies to Help Meet Objectives

**Broad strategies**, with associated *high priority* conservation measures, to address the threats to the survival and recovery of the species and attain the management objective include:

### Inventory and monitoring:

- survey suitable habitat throughout the range to locate new, or relocate unconfirmed or historic, populations.
- support citizen science projects and tools (e.g., iNaturalist), which could return valuable data, be economically feasible, and increase public awareness.

### Research to address knowledge gaps of the species and its habitat:

- Conduct research on threat impacts to the species (e.g., grazing, fire or fire suppression, roads/road maintenance, water management, pesticides).

### Communication, collaboration and engagement:

- Develop and implement beneficial management practices (e.g., for mowing, grazing, integrated pest management) to maintain populations of high quality host plants by engaging with conservation groups, landowners and land managers.
- Develop or adapt communication materials on non-pest grasshopper species, such as Greenish-white grasshopper. Collaborate with governments, conservation agencies and agricultural and ranching associations and programs to distribute materials to landowners and land managers.

### Habitat management and conservation:

- Engage land managers and owners, through conservation or stewardship agreements/ programs, to preserve native and range grasslands that contain host plants, and limit conversion to cropland.
