Current Utility Rates

The Municipality of Oakland-Wawanesa operates the Wawanesa water and wastewater utility and provides services to 251 customers.

Current utility rates were approved effective January 1, 2012 by PUB Order #81/12.

This Utility Rate Study proposes to set utility rates effective January 1, 2023 and January 1, 2024 and 2025.

Reason for Utility Rate Increases

The proposed utility rate increases are primarily required as a result of an increase in the Operating Surplus from 2021 to 2024. The 2024 surplus consists of \$60,000 transfer to Utility Reserve and \$14,486 for 10% Contingency built into Utility Rates in accordance with PUB requirements. In effect, the majority of the increase in rates is required to fund the transfer to Utility Reserve.

Working Capital

The Public Utilities Board requires that water and sewer utilities have a minimum working capital position equal to 20% of Utility expenditures. Working capital is calculated by deducting the tangible capital asset balance from the Utility's accumulated surplus and adding the Utility reserve balances and the outstanding debt balance.

Based on the 2020 audited financial statements, the Utility had a working capital surplus of \$198,156. The Working Capital Surplus is forecast to drop to \$74,731 in 2025. The decrease is due to a combination of decreasing long term debt balance and capital purchases, offset by increases in utility revenues from rate increases.

With gravel/sand soil conditions, water leaks often disappear underground and are very difficult to detect. Wawanesa Utility has taken the following steps to reduce water loss:

- The Utility has its own sonar microphone and Utility staff regularly check for leaks.
- The Utility has also in the past hired a company to check for leaks using a sound correlator device.
- Wawanesa Utility will check the calibration on the WTP outflow meter.
- Utility staff are in the process of doing a door-to-door check of customers water meters and water connections.

Capital

There is \$65,000 a year budgeted from 2022 to 2025 for waterlines with funding from the Utility Reserve.

Inflationary Increase

The financial projections for 2022 to 2025 inclusive assume annual increases of 2% in expenses.

Cost Allocation

Administration cost allocation is proposed to be based on 3% of General Government Services less Assessment and Grants expenses.

Contingency Allowance and Reserves

There is a Contingency Allowance of 10% of net rate costs less amortization expenses and interest costs, included in the rate study. This equates to \$10,551 for water and \$3,934 for wastewater, \$14,486 in total.

There is an annual Transfer to the Utility Reserve of \$60,000 to fund an annual waterline replacement program.

Sewage Lagoon Tipping Fees

There is currently no rate set for sewage lagoon tipping fees but there have been requests for septage dumping at the lagoon. It is proposed to set a lagoon tipping fee of \$30 per 1,000 gallons, effective January 1, 2023, and increase to \$35 per 1,000 gallons in 2024 and \$40 per 1,000 gallons in 2025.







AMM Western Director's Update

While the AMM Board maintains the policy of confidentiality regarding ongoing discussions with the provincial government and stakeholders, we are pleased to share some of the topics with you.

Gas Tax Fund

As of June 29, 2021, the <u>Gas Tax Fund has been renamed the Canada Community-Building Fund (CCBF)</u>. This name change better reflects the program's evolution over time and will not alter or modify the objectives or requirements of the program.

In Budget 2021, the federal government doubled the Gas Tax transfer to municipalities for one year, which was well received as it enables local communities to drive community-transforming projects across Manitoba. Moving forward, the AMM will continue to call on the Government of Canada to phase in a permanent doubling of the GTF/CCBF transfer.

RCMP Unionization

On June 28, 2021, the Government of Canada announced that the RCMP reached a tentative agreement with the National Police Federation (NPF) to establish a collective agreement for RCMP members. The AMM has consistently called on the federal and provincial governments to ensure local communities are not negatively impacted by these changes, especially since unionization will likely lead to potential financial pressures for many municipalities with RCMP contracts.

The AMM formally wrote a letter to Minister Bill Blair about this issue, and we were among the first associations in Canada to call on the federal government to absorb these retroactive costs on behalf of municipalities. The AMM has consistently underscored the importance of ensuring the Government of Canada provide more frequent updates and regular reminders to municipalities regarding how to prepare for these changes, especially with the ongoing pandemic. Moving forward, the AMM will continue to raise this issue at FCM national meetings and other forums.

Full Extended Producer Responsibility (EPR)

In July, Multi-Material Stewardship Manitoba (MMSM), hosted several webinars with representatives of municipal communities to review and seek feedback on specific aspects of the MMSM Transition Plan to full EPR.

Discussions with MMSM have centered around understanding the means in which a transition may occur to a program that is fully managed and financed by industry. The transition plan is ongoing, and the AMM will continue to participate in stakeholder discussions to help ensure MMSM develops a plan for a seamless and orderly transition to full EPR with uninterrupted collection service to Manitobans.

Cities-Caucus meets in Dauphin to chart post-pandemic recovery



Cities Caucus delegates at Dauphin's Countryfest/Ukrainian Festival Amphitheater Click <u>HERE</u> to download photo **September 23, 2021** – Municipal leaders from Manitoba's 10 cities met in Dauphin yesterday to discuss how municipalities can fuel our province's post-pandemic recovery.

"As our province looks to recover from the COVID-19 pandemic, we believe it is important now more than ever for all orders of government to work collaboratively to ensure long-term, predictable, growth-based funding for municipalities that will benefit all Manitobans," stated Cities Caucus Chair and City of Thompson Mayor Colleen Smook.

During the proceedings, delegates discussed the anticipated financial impacts resulting from the nation's first collective agreement for RCMP members which directly affects several Cities Caucus members. "Retroactive pay increases for RCMP members totaling more than 23 per cent will significantly impact municipal budgets. These costs should be fully absorbed by the federal government since municipalities did not have a seat at the negotiating table," noted AMM President Kam Blight.

Addressing the five-year municipal operating funding freeze, tackling local crime and community safety issues, and pursuing economic development opportunities also featured prominently in the discussion. Delegates further shared strategies to increase vaccination rates as well as supported the City of Winnipeg's efforts calling for the ability to use photo noise enforcement technology for nuisance vehicles.

"Municipalities are on the frontlines and continue to deliver essential services that Manitobans rely on. 
Dear Joni,

Childhood Cancer Awareness Month is in September and like last year, we'd like to ask for your help to spread awareness through the #HeroPoseChallenge and the #MakeCanadaGold campaign.

During the month of **September**, we would like to honour the superheroes who have faced or are facing cancer to let them know that they are not alone, and to honour the children who are no longer with us, so their families know we have not forgotten.

Children with cancer are often called superheroes. It's not a moniker they choose. They face unthinkable pain and difficulties during treatment and imagining them with superpowers somehow helps us, as adults, reconcile what we cannot change or fix. And we hope the imagery helps the kids facing cancer too.

It's why we created the **#HeroPoseChallenge**. Hands on hips, chest out, heads high. **By sharing this very simple pose on social media**, we can support and empower kids diagnosed with cancer and help them feel less alone.



Emma's story

Emma had many superpowers. She made tall leaps into the air as a graceful gymnast. After being diagnosed with osteosarcoma, the same cancer as Terry Fox, Emma continued to leap and flip with one prosthetic leg, inspiring all who met her. Emma liked to say, "The only disability in life is a bad attitude". Emma faced her cancer with the same grace with which she leapt into the air. But the treatments offered to Emma were the same painful, high dose chemotherapies used to treat Terry Fox over 40 years ago and her cancer relapsed multiple times. Frustrated with the lack of options, Emma became a passionate childhood cancer advocate and in 2018, she shared her story and leapt into the hearts and minds of viewers on Romania's Got Talent. After her doctors ran out of treatment options, Emma transitioned to Heaven on April 7, 2019.

Number one cause of death by disease

Childhood cancer is the #1 cause of death by disease of Canadian children. About one in five children will not survive their diagnosis and the death rate increases beyond five years. Of those who do survive, 95% will live

with a chronic health problem by the time they are 45 years old.

These children are more than just statistics. It's why we must continue to share their stories. To put a face to childhood cancer, to spread awareness about the importance of support for these families, and to shine a light on the need for more research funding.



In addition to the #HeroPoseChallenge we are also sharing the #MakeCanadaGold campaign, a coordinated effort to light landmarks gold across the country. Throughout the month of September, 59 landmarks across the country will be lit gold to honour kids diagnosed with cancer for the #MakeCanadaGold campaign. Please visit the news section of our website to see a full list of landmarks and dates (dates range throughout September).

SERIOUS INCIDENT REPORT



By law, an employer is required to notify the Workplace Safety and Health (WSH) Branch of a <u>serious incident</u> by the fastest means of communication available.

Serious Incident Alerts include descriptions of the actual serious incidents reported to WSH Branch and are provided to raise awareness and initiate preventative actions as appropriate.

The following **five** incidents occurred on Manitoba construction projects in July 2021:



A worker slipped and fell when climbing down a ladder and landed on both feet.



A worker was on a metal roof when hot water erupted from a chimney and came in contact with the worker's neck, shoulders, arms, and hands.



A worker was operating a truck mounted forklift when it tipped forward and the worker's head came in contact with the rollbar.



A worker was using a tablesaw when the worker's fingers came in contact with the saw blade.



A worker was removing a door when the door fell from the frame and came in contact with the worker's arm.



Safely guarding excavation sites

According to Workplace Safety and Health (WSH) Regulation Part 26.12(1), when excavation work is being carried out in an area where people not engaged in the work may pass by, an employer must ensure that the excavation is adequately guarded by a fence, guardrail, or covering sufficient to prevent a person from falling in the excavation.

Recently, Manitoba WSH officers have issued several improvement orders for guarding excavations. Depending on your site conditions, it's possible you may need to guard your excavation area with a fence to prevent an incident.

Here are some variables to consider:

- Is the excavation site near a school or playground?
- Is it next to a show home or infill housing?
- Is the site located on a corner lot?

 Is it near a neighbourhood path, pedestrian/bike path, or anywhere the public has access to?


If you answer yes to any of the above questions or are concerned that the possibility of someone falling into an excavation exists, put up the appropriate barricades.

Rural Transit Solutions Fund: project planning applications open



Dear FCM members,

Yesterday, the Liberal Party of Canada secured a plurality of seats in the House of Commons and earned the opportunity to form a new government. FCM has congratulated Mr. Trudeau and all 338 members of Parliament—new and returning—who will often be your most direct contacts with the federal realm.

I also want to thank all of *you* who've been working hard to keep municipal priorities front and centre. Whether you were engaging local candidates or taking our message to local media, your efforts have helped set up FCM for success in the crucial months ahead.

What we've achieved

Well before the election, FCM's board rallied behind a set of <u>policy recommendations</u> that we pressed directly with the federal parties. We took those public at a mid-campaign FCM press conference where I was joined by Rural Forum Chair Ray Orb, Big-City Mayors' Caucus Chair Mike Savage, and 2nd Vice President Scott Pearce.

That launch earned significant nationwide **media coverage**, print and broadcast, in both official languages. All told, our campaign message has reached millions through some 1,000 media hits. And just last week, in the campaign's crucial final days, we successfully placed an <u>op-ed on rural priorities</u> in several Postmedia outlets.

FCM's <u>campaign website</u> featured a <u>party commitment tracker</u>—plus <u>engagement</u> <u>tools</u> that members used to press our message with their local candidates and social media networks. FCM's own **social media** campaign earned millions of impressions among key audiences, both organically and through targeted ad placements.

We did all of this with two goals. First, to urge all parties to go on record with meaningful commitments to municipalities—and you can follow our successes on the <u>commitment tracker</u>. Second, we needed to position FCM and municipalities as key federal partners after the election—and we did exactly that.

Moving forward

This new minority Parliament brings new opportunities. This is a time to build bridges to get things done, and that's where municipalities excel. The frontline solutions we deliver help achieve federal objectives that all parties share. Everything from creating jobs and making rental housing more affordable to closing the rural broadband gap and protecting Canadians from new climate extremes. And of course, immediate priorities like shoring up transit operating shortfalls once and for all—and supporting municipalities facing rising costs of RCMP contract policing.

With the election behind us, a new phase begins. FCM will be reaching out to the new government, and to opposition parties as well. We'll start by urging swift action on campaign commitments with cross-party support. We'll look to build on progress started in the last Parliament. And we'll show exactly how empowering communities of all sizes with new tools can drive a stronger, more inclusive recovery.

I'll have more to share in the coming weeks. And once again, your efforts to promote our priorities across the country will be key to our success. Thank you for being there, and please stay tuned.

Good Afternoon,


My name is Jordan from Glen Lea Golf Course in Brandon. I wanted to contact you to let you know we recently bought an Imants root pruner over the winter and have been renting it out to a few golf courses in the area. I got to try it out last season at Glen Lea and was really impressed. We have a ton of trees right beside tees and greens where roots are actually coming through the surface, and it makes quick work of 6"+ roots. This season we have noticed a dramatic decrease in the water these areas need, as well as overall better turf conditions. We have also noticed a dramatic decrease in cart path / pavement heaving due to tree roots, which is where I think parks, towns, municipalities, etc. would also benefit. Fixing and maintaining asphalt is a costly and labour intensive process, so by eliminating the roots that cause damage it will save money in the long run. Many customers in the area have also used it on their green spaces, parks, cemeteries, etc. with great results.


