The Council members of the Municipality of Oakland-Wawanesa met at the Nesbitt Hall, in Nesbitt, Manitoba on Monday, January 20, 2020 at 7:00 p.m. Members Present: Councillors Cory, Hargreaves, Hatch, McDonald, McGregor and Sowiak. Head of Council Dave Kreklewich presided.

#### CALL TO ORDER – 7:00 p.m.

With a quorum present, Head of Council Dave Kreklewich called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. and advised that the purpose of the meeting was to hold Public Hearings with respect to the special levies.

Verbal representation was received as follows:

Barry Fowell, NE 4-7-18, asked questions related to contributions from Glenboro-South Cypress to the Souris River Recreation Commission. His name appears on the petition.

Brian Buie, NE 35-7-17, advised the numbers being considered were not inconsequential and asked what Council was going to use the additional 10% or \$250,000 for, as in his view, this was an additional tax over what had been taxed in previous years. He also asked questions about parcels of land that had more than one family living on it and at what point would the levies expire.

Gord McLaughlin, NW 35-8-19W, appeared in objection to paying a recreation levy. His name appears on the petition.

Mike Sitko, SE 24-8-19W, asked why the recreation levy was going to specialized areas of recreation and suggested funding be only by user fees. His name appears on the petition.

Dennis Rome, NE 26-7-18 W, asked why the amount of recreation fees have increased so drastically since pre-amalgamation, particularly with an increase to rural versus the village and why the rural area was paying \$66,000 in 2020. His name appears on the petition.

Mike Hawkins, SE 16-8-18W, asked questions related to life expectancy of the recreation facilities. He also asked if there had ever been a survey on who uses the facilities.

He suggested taxes should be based on population.

Dennis Rome, NE 26-7-18 W, appeared to ask questions related to outside use of the waste transfer stations. He also asked about the rationale of charging bare land a per parcel rate. His name appears on the petition.

Mike Sitko, SE 24-8-19W, appeared to ask questions from the 2014 consolidated financial statements to the 2019 budgets. He also stated there was disproportionate taxation for rural residents on items calculated at-large whereby rural ratepayers pick up 86% of the at-large charges. His name appears on the petition.

Linda McCrae Walker, SE 31-8-19W, appeared to ask if a special levy could be set up to differentiate the waste specific to Oakland and to Wawanesa, particularly on farm property.

Ray Walker, SE 31-8-19, appeared to ask how funds were received from Glenboro-South Cypress for use of the waste transfer station.

Gisele Corriveau, NW 22-8-19W, appeared to ask questions about revenue and expenses and how it relates to changes in residential properties in Wawanesa and Oakland. She objected to the disproportionate increase in rural taxation. Her name appears on the petition.

Jean Boulton, NW 11-8-19W, appeared to ask questions related to increases and suggested the costs seem too high and should be looked at.

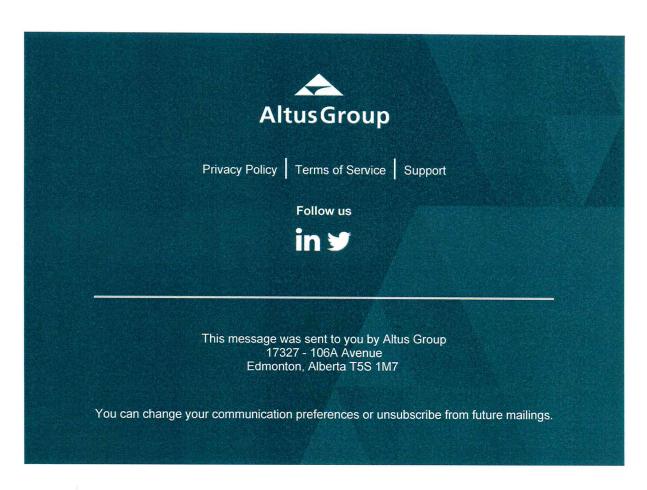

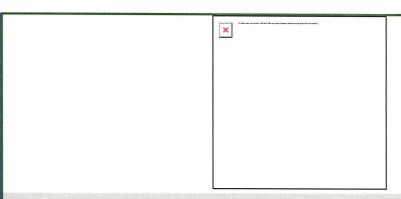

**February 3, 2020** - AMM President Ralph Groening and Executive Director Denys Volkov recently traveled to Ukraine last week to support the Federation of Canadian Municipalities (FCM) International's <u>Partnership for Local Economic Development and Democratic Governance (PLEDDG) Project.</u>

The AMM was invited to deliver three separate presentations in the cities of Kharkiv and Zaporizhzhia on the importance of gender equality and women in municipal government as well as municipal advocacy and financial independence of municipal associations.

"It was a great pleasure to not only meet our Ukrainian partners but also have the opportunity to share a Canadian perspective to municipal governance. We delivered three successful presentations that fostered fruitful discussion as well as participated in several one-on-one meetings with senior officials who see interest in building relationships with Manitoba municipalities. Building these partnerships present opportunities to share best practices that help strengthen municipal governance in both countries," stated AMM President Ralph Groening.

The AMM would like to thank FCM and PLEDDG for the opportunity to share our experience with our Ukrainian partners. 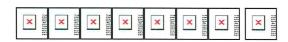

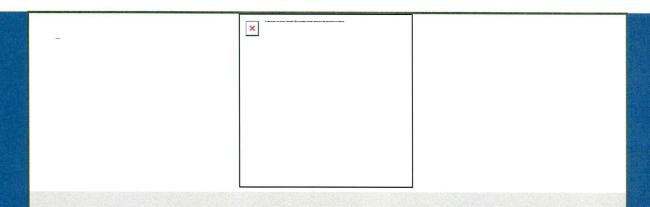

Important information regarding Federal Grade Crossings Compliance and Safety

**February 11, 2020** - Under the <u>Grade Crossings Regulation</u>, municipalities share responsibility for managing the safety at federally-regulated grade crossings. Existing federally-regulated grade crossings must meet the requirements of the Regulations by <u>November 28, 2021</u>.

To better prepare for this compliance requirement, the AMM requested Transport Canada to provide helpful links and resources to better assist municipalities. In response, Transport Canada has provided the <u>attached document</u>, which is a summary of information from its website.

**February 12, 2020** - AMM representatives were in Ottawa this week to attend meetings for the Contract Management Committee (CMC) and discuss a range of community safety issues of interest to municipalities, such as rural crime, RCMP labour relations and member pay, and overall RCMP contract costs.

Since the Prairie Provinces are experiencing higher rates of rural crime compared to urban areas according to <u>Statistics Canada</u>, Manitoba municipalities have been ringing the alarm on increasing crime rates in their communities.

Meanwhile, according to a new study by the <u>Angus Reid Institute</u>, half of Canadians (48%) now say that crime has increased in their community over the past five years, up from 42 per cent in 2018 and 30 per cent in 2014. The Crime Severity Index (CSI) has also risen for the fourth straight year.

"As policing and public safety is the fastest-growing cost for municipalities, the AMM supports the concept of a federal government study into crime in rural areas

throughout Canada and how funding can be leveraged to support policing services in municipalities," stated Denys Volkov, AMM Executive Director.

The CMC is a forum dedicated to consultation and communication between the Provinces/Territories (PTs) and Public Safety Canada/RCMP with respect to managing the national RCMP contract. Local government representatives from across Canada attended the meeting.

The AMM represents all 137 municipalities in Manitoba.

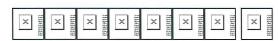

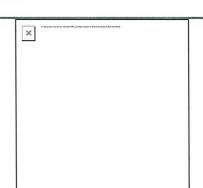

## Province Launches \$3-Million Flood Protection Program for Municipalities

**February 12, 2020** - Please be advised that the Manitoba government invites all municipalities to submit proposals for one-time funding to support and enhance municipal capacity and capability to prepare for a possible 2020 spring flood emergency, and to build resiliency for future floods.

Under the program, municipalities can be reimbursed for up to 100 per cent of approved flood preparedness or resiliency projects and equipment costs. The maximum funding available for each municipality will be based on the total value of all approved proposals, but up to \$150,000 may be available for each municipal proposal. Consideration will be given for funding of up to \$500,000 for the City of Winnipeg should flood risk warrant additional investment.

Please note that <u>proposals are due by February 28, 2020,</u> and must be submitted by email to <u>mrmca@gov.mb.ca.</u>

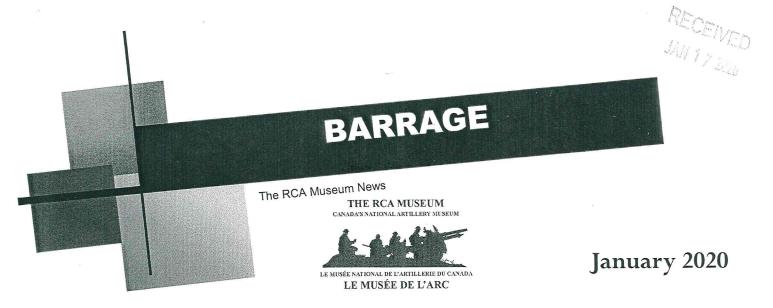

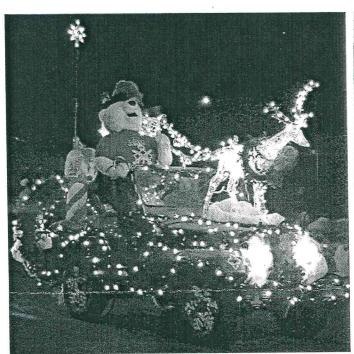

As Museum Director, on behalf of the RCA Museum, I would like to thank Deanne Gilbertson for her excellent work within our collection. She is doing a great job conserving our collection.

## A Gunner Wedding with a C1 105mm Howitzer



We occasionally receive requests to have our artifacts at outreach events such as military weddings, retirement ceremonies and funerals. Veterans or serving soldiers can request to have one or more of our artifacts at special events. We try our best to accommodate. We have a number of artifacts that are commonly used, including; an M109 A4+ 155mm Howitzer, C1 105mm Howitzer, parade Jeep, WW2 Field Artillery Tractor with limber and 25 Pounder, and a WW2 25 Pounder Wedding Limber.

Last September, a Gunner featured our C1 105mm Howitzer and parade Jeep at his wedding. Note the wedding photo of Ryan & Brittany Gilks dated 7 September 2019. They held their wedding just north of Brandon, Manitoba. We are glad that we could participate.

#### Construction at the Museum

A crew of construction workers built a new vestibule on the back of our archives in the museum. They also updated our air handling units and made a number of improvements to the building. This was a slow process that lasted roughly six months from March 2019 to October 2019. Back in March, we needed to move many of our artifacts so the construction crews could do their work. By early December, we were able to move all the artifacts back to their correct locations.

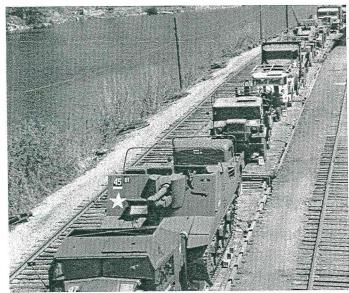
Note the photo to the right. The vestibule should make it easier to transfer artifacts from the archives to the museum in an air controlled environment.



## The Dr. Gregg Collection

In 1986, Dr. Gregg donated hundreds of artifacts to the RCA Museum, including 40 excellent examples of Canadian inspired WW2 vehicles and guns. Dr. Gregg was a self-confessed history nut, a former professor and a veterinarian. Dr. Gregg started collecting in the mid-1970s and by the mid-1980s had amassed a massive collection of WW2 vehicles. His collection included dozens of significant examples of Canadian inspired or manufactured vehicles. He collected the artifacts from farmyards across Southern Ontario, from scrap dealers, and from Denmark.

In 1985, he looked for a museum or institution that would safeguard the entire collection. He graciously donated his entire collection to the RCA Museum in 1986. Our curatorial records from the time period are bursting with files on the Gregg Collection. At the time, the Base Commander, Col John-Arch MacInnis, and the RCA Museum Committee set the wheels in motion to make this transfer possible. Due to the immense size of the collection this was a very difficult and complicated transfer.





Moving this huge collection from southern Ontario to Shilo, Manitoba was a substantial undertaking. Ultimately, the military shipped these vehicles and guns by rail. Note the photos above.

Included in the collection were vehicles, armoured personnel carriers, maintenance manuals, and hundreds of parts and memorabilia. It is a significant, world-class artifact collection. In April 1986, the Canadian Cultural Properties Board confirmed the Gregg Collection as a cultural property which, in part, restricted the entire collection from being exported. The collection is certainly of national importance and worthy of this designation. Back in 1986, Dr. Gregg said: "These pieces are dramatic symbols of Canada's 'coming of age' both politically and militarily."

One of the great artifacts in the collection is the Crerar Caravan. General H. D. G. "Harry" Crerar, Commander of the First Army from March 1944, used this caravan during the European Campaign. The caravan includes his sleeping quarters and an office area. General Crerar received important guests in the caravan. Reputed guests include: General Eisenhower, General Montgomery, George VI and Winston Churchill. We will include the Crerar's Caravan in our next temporary exhibit on VE Day, opening early May 2020.

We understand and appreciate Dr. Gregg's vision and commitment to Canadian history. He came to us because he trusted that the Canadian military and our museum would guard, restore, display and keep the collection together. It's a collection that could fill most museums and we house most of it in our M101 storage facilities or on display at the museum. Dr. Gregg passed away in 2000. We certainly thank him for this amazing donation.

One of our objectives at the museum is to tell the story of the Canadian military during WW2. This world-class collection helps us do that. This acquisition greatly improved our collection of WW2 military vehicles. Our WW2 displays contain Gregg Collection artifacts. This collection simplifies the process of making exhibits, due to the sheer number of excellent examples of Canadian inspired WW2 vehicles and guns. We are proud to have this collection and we will continue to showcase it in our museum exhibits and outreach events.

## Dr. Gregg WW2 Vehicles

Below are five vehicles from the Gregg Collection, including tracked and wheeled vehicles. The Gregg Collection consists of hundreds of artifacts, including dozens of WW2 vehicles that were uniquely Canadian in character. The artifacts below garner significant attention.

#### Staghound



This 1942 Staghound version T17E1 was designed for armoured and reconnaissance regiments for both short and long distance operations. It was also used for special missions such as raids, securing tactical positions and the protection of headquarters and convoys. Variations of armament included the basic 37mm gun, 3 inch howitzer, 75mm tank gun and the twin .50 calibre machine gun for the anti-aircraft role. This vehicle was manufactured by General Motors.

The Grizzly Command Tank (M4A1) was the Canadian ver-

sion of the U.S. Medium Tank M4A1, the Sherman. It was the most modern and successful medium tank type available to the Allies in WWII and was the standard medium tank from 1943-1945. Over 70 variants were produced. The Grizzly's armament consisted of a 75mm gun with a coaxial .30 cal machine gun, a bow mounted .30 cal machine gun and a .50 cal machine gun on the top of the turret for anti-aircraft fire. The Montreal Locomotive Works manufactured the tank. Total Canadian production: 188.

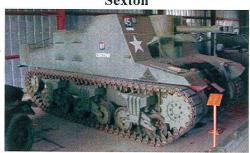
Fox Mark 1



The Fox Mark 1 is a closed turret, mounted, 4x4, rear engine, armoured, wheeled vehicle designed for reconnaissance and patrol duties with armoured regiments. Armed with a coaxially mounted .50 cal and .30 cal machine guns, it was also fitted with smoke grenade dischargers which would aid in concealing its whereabouts from the enemy. A distinct feature of the Fox is the auxiliary rear facing steering wheel which allowed the crew to get out of trouble quickly. It was manufactured by General Motors of Canada Ltd. with a total Canadian production of 1,506.

The 25 Pounder Self-Propelled Sexton was designed as a field artillery piece with high cross-country mobility for use in the Armoured Division. Due to its mobility, armour, and firepower, it was able to give close artillery support to armoured brigades. The Sexton's main armament was a QF 25 pounder gun. Its secondary armament was a pair of .303 inch Bren Guns. Powered by a 9-cylinder radial engine, it developed 400 BHP with a maximum speed of 25 MPH. The Sexton included a detachment of six men. The Montreal Locomotive Works built the Sexton with a total production of 2,150.

The Stuart Light Tank (M5A1) was used by armoured regiments and armoured reconnaissance (Recce) regiments. Because of its extreme mobility and good firepower, it was well suited for this task. Armaments included a gyro-stabilized 37mm gun, three .30 cal MGs (one fixed), and a .45 cal submachine gun. Powered by twin Cadillac V-8 engines, it rarely broke down, was easy to maintain and refused to shed its track no matter how many high speed turns it was subjected to. The American Car and Foundry Company manufactured the Stuart Tank with a total production of 3,427.

## An Unexpected Letter

At the RCA Museum, we strive to honor the memory of those who have served Canada. Recently, I was reviewing an old scrapbook donated by Major H. R. Turner, who raised the 94<sup>th</sup> Anti-Tank Battery, RCA, part of the 3<sup>rd</sup> Division during WW2. Similar to other WW2 batteries, the 94<sup>th</sup> Anti-Tank Battery has a noteworthy history, which includes its share of sacrifice. The scrapbook is a great primary source on the time period with newspaper clippings, original posters, propaganda, hand-written letters, military documents and photos. To the right is a photo of Major Turner from the scrapbook.

You never know what you'll find looking through old albums. Major Turner saved two letters from the mothers of Canadian Gunners killed in action during WW2. Both letters are difficult to read due to the delicate subject matter. I will include one letter from Mrs. Amy Erickson of Creston, B.C., dated 17 June 1945 to Major Turner, who was Second in Command of the 94<sup>th</sup>.



Dear Six

I am writing to thank you for the very kind letter you wroke to me explaining the death of my beloved Son.

Your letter dated May 15 1945 was the first word I had sixee I received that awfullcable dug 26 1944, but that is the fortunes of war, he was all I had, and his death leaves me very much alone, as my husband died fine year's ago. and I mis the both very much.

again thanking you for your kind letter and wishing you the best of luck.

I remain sineerly

any buildson

A humbling letter from a grieving mother. We should honor and remember this heartfelt sacrifice. Officers commonly wrote letters to the families of fallen soldiers. Major Turner surely provided condolence and insight after the death of her son. Her son was (K75301) L/Bdr. Edwin V. Erickson, killed in action on 8 August 1944, aged 26, near Caen, France. They buried Edwin in the Bretteville-Sur-Laize Canadian War Cemetery.

Major Turner raised the 94<sup>th</sup> Anti-Tank Battery in August 1939. The 94<sup>th</sup> trained in Canada until sailing to Liverpool in October 1941. Upon arrival, the 94<sup>th</sup> went to the south coast of England to carry out an anti-invasion role. On the morning of 6 June 1944, D-Day, they landed on Juno Beach supporting the 7<sup>th</sup> Brigade. Over the next eight weeks, they fought the Germans in Normandy resulting in heavy casualties. They continued the fight with the liberation of France, the Netherlands, and then the Allied invasion of Germany. During WW2, forty soldiers died from the 94<sup>th</sup>, including L/Bdr. Edwin V. Erickson.

### Korean War Trophy

The RCA Museum has a post-WW2, 122mm M1938 (M-30) Howitzer originally designed in the Soviet Union. Our records say it was captured by the South Korean Army during the Korean War. It was eventually shipped to Canada and became part of our collection and is currently placed in our Gun Park. The story is hard to substantiate. However, this model of gun was used by the North Korean People's Army against Canadian and United Nations forces during the Korean War (1950-1953).

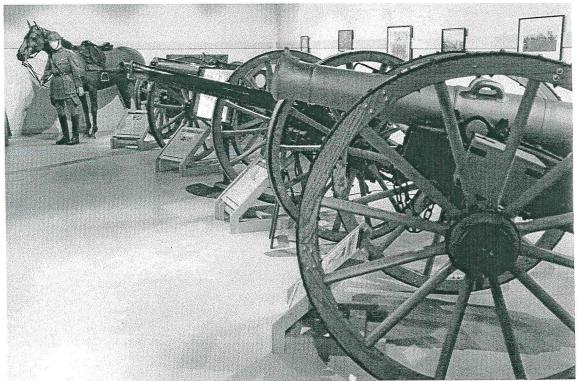
On 25 June 1950, the North Korean Army invaded South Korea. In response, the UN organized a multinational police force to defend South Korea. The United States led the action and Canada supported it. On 7 August 1950, the Canadian government authorized sending Canadian soldiers to Korea. The 25th Infantry Brigade Group, with support arms, went to Korea. 2 RCHA, raised in Shilo, Manitoba, provided the initial artillery component. In May 1951, 2 RCHA arrived in South Korea with the 25 pounder gun and saw action only weeks later. The war settled into a series of small incursions by both sides. By May 1952, 2 RCHA had expended over 300,000 rounds.

In May 1952, 1 RCHA replaced 2 RCHA in South Korea. By the spring of 1953, the Korean War developed into a period of static warfare. The 81st Field Regiment RCA, later named 4 RCHA, replaced 1 RCHA in April 1953. Canadian Gunners kept up a relentless bombardment of enemy positions. On 27 July 1953, the war came to a halt with the signing of the Korean Armistice Agreement. Over 25,500 Canadians had served in the Korean theatre of operations by the time of the armistice.

Canadian soldiers stayed in South Korea to maintain the peace. The 79th Field Regiment RCA, renamed 3 RCHA, took over for the 81st Field Regiment in April 1954. 3 RCHA served in South Korea until November 1954. The human cost of the war to Canada was 516 military personnel killed and 1,211 wounded.

## 19<sup>th</sup> Century Artillery

About one year ago, we changed our Heritage Gallery from a collection of military uniforms and medals to five nineteenth century artillery pieces. Updating keeps things fresh and exciting. The two smooth bore cannons, the 6 Pounder and the 9 Pounder, represent the early days of the Canadian Artillery. These muzzle loading cannons are steeped in history. They fired solid shot and fused shells, including the well-known Shrapnel shell that exploded on enemy lines. The British deployed them in the Napoleonic Wars (1803-1814), the Battle of Waterloo (1815), the Crimean War (1853-1856), the Indian Mutiny (1857-1859), and during various campaigns around the world. Colonists and British Regulars used them during the War of 1812.

The other three artillery pieces, help explain the Boer War. The three pieces include: the 15 Pounder BL, the 1 Pounder "Pom Pom" and the French 75mm Field Gun. In 1899, the British entered the Boer War with the 15 Pounder BL. The gun had no recoil mechanism. After firing, the gun rolled backwards, requiring reaiming. It also had no gun shield leaving Gunners exposed to enemy fire. The range of the weapon was rather limited. The ammunition was loaded in two steps, first the projectile and then the propellant charge. This process was slow and delayed the rate of fire.

The French 75mm Field Gun represented a major technological advancement and was the first modern artillery piece using hydro-pneumatic recoil and fixed ammunition. The Boer used a similar model against the British. After firing, the gun did not require re-aiming. It had a gun shield, improved range, and the ammunition was loaded in one step, increasing the rate of fire. The British found themselves out gunned by the quick-firing technology. The British learned from their experience during the Boer War. They designed new artillery for mobility, improved projectile ballistics, improved loading speed, added recoil mechanisms, and increased the shell weight for more firepower. They also added gun shields for protection. This led to the adoption of the QF 13 Pounder for the Horse Artillery and the QF 18 Pounder for the Field Artillery. Both are on display at the RCA Museum.

#### L5 105mm Pack Howitzer

The L5 pack howitzer is a popular attraction both in our museum and on our website. It garners a lot of attention at outreach events. It was termed 'pack howitzer' because it could be broken down into 12 or 13 sections and transported by pack animals. In Canadian service it was generally transported by vehicle or helicopter. After removing the gun shield it could be transported in the back of a M113, which the RCA Museum has in our collection. We have many photos of this gun in action. I have included some photos, mostly from the

1970s and 1980s.



The main benefit of the gun was that it was light compared to the C1 105mm howitzer. It could be easily broken down and manhandled by gunners. The total weight of the gun was 1,290 kgs, which is very light for a 105mm gun. The lack of weight also meant the gun was not very robust or built for continuous firing. In our museum archives, I located a number of original documents noting problems with cracks in the barrel. Generally, it was transported without the muzzle break. In our archives, I

found original documents mentioning when the muzzle break was transported on the gun, it tended to vibrate and damage the barrel. Another issue was the lack of range with this weapon, up to 10,000 meters, which made it vulnerable to counter-fire.

The L5 pack howitzer could be used for direct fire or indirect fire. At the museum, we recently added direct and indirect sights. Note the photo below of the Telescope NG No. 76 direct sight.



In Canadian Service, this was an airborne weapon. Canada actively used this gun from 1969-1994. During that timeframe thousands of Canadian Gunners trained on this gun and it gained a wide following. It's noted that both the L5 pack howitzer and the C1 105mm howitzer used the same 105mm ammunition with a 32 pound projectile. We have many examples of 105mm projectiles on display in our museum. Come and check it out!











## The Earl Grey Cups

The Winnipeg Blue Bombers won the Grey Cup in November 2019. For all Blue Bomber fans this cup has renewed importance.

At the RCA Museum, we have an Earl Grey cup that predates the Grey Cup used in the Canadian Football League (CFL). Albert Henry George Grey, 4<sup>th</sup> Earl Grey GCB, GCMG, GCVO, PC, the Governor General of Canada, commissioned a number of cups, including the CFL Grey Cup and three Canadian Artillery cups.

Albert Grey, 4<sup>th</sup> Earl Grey was the Governor General of Canada from 1904 to 1911. He was a strong promoter of social justice and national unity within the British Empire. He heavily supported the arts, including sports such as hockey and football. Of note, Earl Grey ordered the Grey Cup in November 1909; which arrived in March 1910. The first Grey Cup championship game occurred on 4 December 1909 without the Grey Cup.

Mappin & Webb, a jewellery company from Birmingham, England, made the small cup pictured to the right which is on display at the RCA Museum. Earl Grey reportedly commissioned the cup as a trophy for the Canadian amateur rugby football association that became the Canadian Football League. The story told is the Earl was so unimpressed with the cup that he ordered another much larger cup which became the CFL Grey Cup.

From 1906 to 1908, Governor General Earl Grey commissioned and presented three cups to

separate branches of the Canadian Artillery. Our cup is for 1<sup>st</sup> place in General Efficiency (Heavy and Siege Batteries). There was also a General Efficiency cup for Coast Defence and one for Field Batteries.

The second artillery cup is located at the Senior Mess in Red Deer, Alberta. The Canadian Artillery Association presented the cup to the 13<sup>th</sup> Winnipeg Field Battery. We are not sure where the third cup is located.

The Canadian Artillery has a long history of presenting General Efficiency cups dating back to the 1880s. Governor General Earl Grey added to the already large collection of military cups housed on military bases across the country. Our cup and the one in Red Deer certainly have charming pasts linked to Earl Grey and the CFL Grey Cup.

Collection bags for the small pesticide & fertilizer container recycling program now available province wide!

Thank you for being part of Cleanfarms empty pesticide and fertilizer container collection program.

This year, Cleanfarms will be offering farmers across the province ag recycling bags for <23L empty pesticide and fertilizer container recycling program.

Your municipal collection site staff will see empty, rinsed containers returned in collection bags this year - please ensure staff accept both bagged and loose containers.

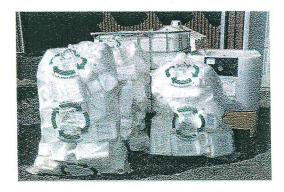
Cleanfarms' contractors will be picking up both loose and bagged containers.

## **Fast Facts:**

- Ag recycling bags make it easier to recycle 100% of empty jugs.
- Farmers will receive container collection bags from their ag retailer.
- Farmers may now return bagged containers to the municipal collection site.
- Please accept jugs LOOSE or BAGGED (the old way, or the new way).
- Ensure all containers are triple/ pressure rinsed.
- · Different process for seed treatment containers applies.

Ag recycling bags help to:

- Provide farmers with an easier way to collect and transport empty pesticide and fertilizer jugs (23L and smaller) to your collection site, which will;
- Encourage farmers to recycle 100% of their pesticide and fertilizer containers, and;
- · Help keep municipal sites clean.



Cleanfarms piloted the use of collection bags this year in the Neepawa/ Gladstone and Winkler areas of the province and we received positive feedback from participating retailers, growers, and municipalities, as well as many requests from individuals outside of the pilot area hoping to have access to this tool.

## HOW THIS WORKS FOR FARMERS:

- Farmers will get an ag recycling bag from their retailer.
- Farmers will rinse the empty jugs and remove the booklet before placing the jugs in the collection bag.
- Once full, bags are to be securely closed and tied (rope, tie strap or tight knot).
- Farmers will take full collection bags to their local municipal collection site.

## HOW THIS WORKS FOR MUNICIPAL COLLECTION SITES:

- Municipal site staff will inspect the containers and accept only clean, rinsed containers (loose or in bags).
- There is no need to remove the jugs from bags, or require the jugs to be bagged if they are returned loose.
- Important note re. Seed Treatment Containers (blue/ red containers)
  - Seed treatment containers need to be handled differently. Seed treatment jugs should be rinsed, if possible. If rinsing is not possible, caps should be securely closed.
  - Unrinsed seed treatment jugs must be stored together (blue and red together) in a separate bag to prevent product leakage on other containers.
  - Due to the dye in seed treatment jugs, they are sent for proper disposal instead of for recycling.

# Enbridge Line 3 Replacement Program Pipeline Decommissioning - Update

Construction of the new Line 3 replacement pipeline and associated facilities has been completed on schedule in Canada. I want to personally thank you for your support and patience throughout construction.

With the replacement pipeline having been placed into operation in December 2019, the next phase for L3RP involves decommissioning of the existing Line 3 pipeline, which we anticipate will begin in Spring 2021. Before we begin this work, it is important to Enbridge that we discuss and seek feedback on the decommissioning process with you, specifically on Condition 11 of the Decommissioning Order (MO-008-2016):

Condition 11 requires Enbridge to develop a final decommissioning plan that, among other
things, comprehensively describes the decommissioning activities and the parameters that
will be monitored during the decommissioned period and summarizes engagement with
stakeholders and Indigenous groups regarding the plan as well as how input obtained
through that engagement has been incorporated into the plan.

We propose to file responses to Condition 11 with the Canada Energy Regulator (CER) in June 2020. To that end, Enbridge would like to hear from you.

# Enbridge Line 3 Replacement Program Pipeline Decommissioning - Background

On December 1, 2016, the National Energy Board, now the Canada Energy Regulator (CER), issued Certificate OC-063 and Order XO-E1010-004-2016 authorizing the construction and operation of the Line 3 Replacement Program (L3RP) along with Order MO-008-2016 (Decommissioning Order) for the decommissioning of the existing Line 3 pipeline.

These approvals are subject to legal requirements that provide the CER with ongoing oversight of the L3RP. These conditions must be met for the L3RP to proceed through the various stages of its life cycle.



We are now in the final clean-up phase and expect to have the right of way fully restored later this year. # International Development Week 2020 — #GoForTheGoals

This year, we celebrate International Development Week by highlighting how FCM's international programs help implement the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development and meet the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs).

The Agenda is a global plan of action aiming to end poverty, protect the planet and ensure that all people enjoy peace and prosperity by 2030. In other words, it is a path that seeks to shift the world toward a less wasteful, less destructive and more sustainable and equitable mindset.

Canadian municipalities are at the heart of Canada's international efforts to reach the Sustainable Development goals and implement the 2030 Agenda. All week, we are celebrating our partnership with Global Affairs Canada by highlighting the impact our programs have made to achieving key targets. We invite you to join FCM's celebration of international development throughout the week — follow along on social media and tell us how your community will #GoForTheGoals in 2020.

FCM is proud to support the Government of Canada in the achievement of these crucial targets, both at home and abroad. In this issue, we bring you stories of how our Canadian and international local government partners are contributing to this global effort.

# SDG #5: Achieve gender equality and empower all women and girls

One of the many ways FCM's international programs #GoForTheGoals is through focusing on gender equality and political empowerment at the local government level. All around the world, we help women elected officials become more effective leaders, through techniques like specialized training and creating peer support networks.

In Tunisia, the Inclusive Municipal Leadership Program is supporting a new generation of women leaders to deliver inclusive services and create more political participation. With technical support from Canadian municipal specialists, our partner municipalities in Tunisia will integrate the gender aspect into their day-to-day management practices, develop inclusive services, help foster an environment that promotes the political involvement of women in the management of local affairs. Learn more.

The Municipal Cooperation Program, based in Haiti, has done quite a bit of training with women elected officials. In 2019, we collaborated with the Federation of Women Elected Official (FENAFEMH) to train more than 700 local elected women. This effort aimed to leverage the opportunity created by the last elections, which saw 30% of women elected to local office. Learn more.

In Colombia, women represent half of the population yet make up only 12% of all mayors. Colombian women face many barriers that hold them back from entering into politics, such as limited education and political experience, gender norms that place household responsibilities on women, lack of support and financial resources, lack of information and resources, and lack of confidence. The Network of Women Mayors for Democracy and Peace was created to combat these barriers and to promote the leadership and participation of women mayors. The women mayors supported each other to overcome these challenges and lead their communities with confidence. Learn more.

# SDG #8: Decent work and economic growth

Inclusive and sustainable economic growth is an essential part of our international development work. Many of our international programs #GoForTheGoals by creating financial mechanisms to support local govs, small businesses, and community projects. These small projects have ripple effects, providing a road map for other communities wanting to adopt these practices. It's a small investment that has a profound impact in the countries where we work.

In Ukraine, the Partnership for Local Economic Development and Democratic Governance has two funds that support both democratic governance projects and small & medium enterprises. One notable project is the Business Training Centre in Poltava. The centre provides job training and employment for women from vulnerable populations, such as those recently discharged from detention facilities and internally displaced persons. Learn more.

Meanwhile, in Colombia and Peru, the CISAL Fund provided technical assistance and grants for business or social projects. From 2014 to 2019, the CISAL Fund trained 500 women in the formulation of business plans and social projects and provided technical assistance to 87 projects led by women or women's associations. These projects benefited more than 2,450 women. The Fund also offered training to 370 women to increase the possibility of being selected for the financing of their initiatives. Learn more.

More than half of the funded projects focused on women's empowerment or women's equity. CISAL supported women entrepreneurs like Doris Cruz, who used the funds to grow and legally incorporate the Women's Association of Ccapacmarca. Thanks to the CISAL Fund, the Association now supports over 150 women to access economic opportunities, support food sovereignty and increase political participation. Learn more.

# SDG #11: Make cities and human settlements inclusive, safe, resilient and sustainable

Sustainable Development Goal #11 is about making cities and human settlements inclusive, safe, resilient and sustainable. Canadian municipalities #GoForTheGoals by supporting local government's capacity to deliver services and manage infrastructure.

This includes programs like the Jordan Municipal Support Project (JMSP), which works with Jordan's Ministry of Local Administration to improve solid waste management (SWM) in 12 municipalities. JMSP's approach to planning is unique in the region. Canadian technical advisors had to overcome scepticism and mistrust, but after just one year, can report incredible positive outcomes, from increased knowledge of SWM to embracing the need for good data and to understanding how behavior change with citizens is a key component for any SWM plan.

Learn about how Canadian technical advisors from Colchester, NS and Yorkton, SK worked with their Jordanian counterparts to develop a collaborative, methodical, and community-oriented approach to solid waste management. Read the case study.

Municipalities are on the front lines of delivering services & ensuring human settlements are inclusive, safe, resilient and sustainable. Haitian law currently requires that property deeds be handwritten into official registries in order to be legally recognized. This leads to errors, lost copies and registration turnaround times of over 400 business days.

With the Haiti Digitalization of Land Registry Project, Canadian experts are helping modernize the land registry process in Haiti as a way to encourage prosperity and economic growth, making it easier for professionals to search and identify titles, thereby ensuring that Haiti's homeowners and entrepreneurs can claim their property rights and access credit. This program is also featuring a pilot project in which municipalities thanks to a centralized territory information system can managed local taxes and cadaster. This program wraps up at the end of this year — keep an eye out for a special issue all about this unique project.

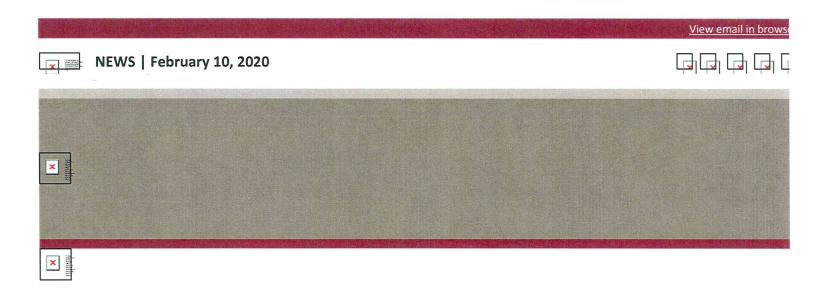

Hello:

In April 2019, the Government of Manitoba passed The Accessible Employment Standard Regulation. This standard will make accessibility a regular part of recruiting, hiring and supporting employees who experience barriers in the workplace. The standard will help Manitobans with disabilities participate in our labour force and economy, and help employers find untapped and reliable talent.

Most of the requirements under this standard will come into force incrementally: one year after enactment for the Government of Manitoba (in May 2020) two years for the public sector (in May 2021) and three years for the private and non-profit sectors (in May 2022). However, safety comes first.

By May 1, 2020, all employers in Manitoba with one or more employees will need to prioritize employee safety by complying with sections 15 and 16 of the standard. This means employers will need to:

- 1. Provide employees experiencing barriers with appropriate information on how to respond to an emergency in the workplace, and
- 2. With the employee's consent, provide necessary information to a person designated to assist the employee during an emergency.

In order to help employers comply with these requirements, the Disabilities Issues Office (Government of Manitoba) has developed a Workplace Emergency Response information Toolkit, which includes sample memos and employee emergency templates that can be adapted for use in your organization.

Thank you for your letter to the Honourable Ron R. Schuler, Minister of Infrastructure, regarding road repairs on Provincial Trunk Highway (PTH) 2 at the turnoff onto Road 108W. Your letter was shared with me and I am pleased to respond on behalf of Manitoba Infrastructure.

Surface maintenance of municipal roads, such as Road 108W, falls under the responsibility of the Rural Municipality (RM). The limits of the RM's responsibility start at the outer edge of the shoulder along PTH 2. The Manitoba Infrastructure's acting Maintenance Manager met with the local superintendent and foreman in September to review this concern. The area of repair was located under municipal jurisdiction.

Thank you again for your letter and your attention to safety in your community. Road safety is a value that Manitoba Infrastructure shares with the Municipality of Oakland Wawanesa. 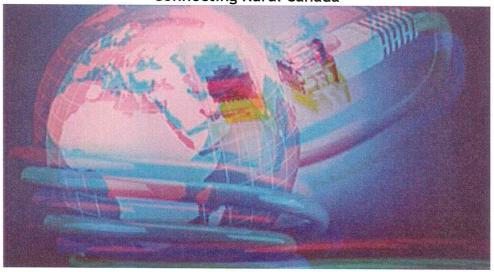

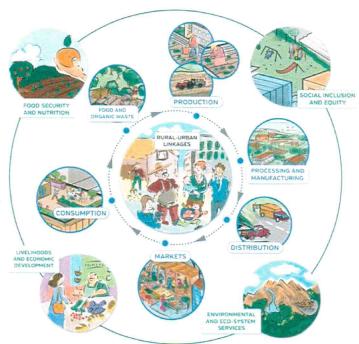

## Introduction

There is a need to review the dominant thought about food systems in regional contexts, in a way in which rural, peri-urban and urban areas are incorporated together in the same territorial planning to increase the level of equity in access and security for local people. From here, the need of a bottom-up approach in which national government provides support for local strategies (OECD 2016). The City Region Food System offers an ideal perspective to analyze this relation, where at the core stand food dependencies and inter relation. These high-risk areas need targeted strategies to ensure sustainable food systems with the final purpose of ensuring food security for the population.

A profound disjunction between rural-urban development in the food system persists, even though the areas remain connected by ecological, social and economic aspects. As a result of changing, the governance of rural context has become more complex and diversified and the rural development policy has been less able to response to its needs. The combination of spatial differences and economic diversity becomes the focus for a robust formulation of policy framework about rural and urban contexts: the integrated development approach cannot be decoupled from a place-based perspective. We have been contacted by a few municipalities requesting a copy of the Southwest Horizon School Division's preliminary budget presentation in advance of our AGM/Public Budget Consultation presentation scheduled for 7:00 pm on February 12<sup>th</sup> at Hartney School. We still hope you will send representation to the AGM/Public Budget Consultation, but as requested, I am attaching our budget presentation as well as a handout we intend to distribute at the AGM outlining some of the division's local initiatives and future concerns.

As a reminder, our AGM/Public Budget Consultation will be held at:

### Hartney School Band Room at 7:00 p.m.

### on Wednesday, February 12, 2020

In brief, you will see in the attached SHSD 2020/21 Budget presentation that:

- Provincial funding has decreased 2% or by \$172,245.
- The Province is limiting school divisions to a 2% Special Requirement increase.
- With other small revenue budget changes, the division's revenue can only change by \$97,500.
- This means the division's expenditure budget can also only change by \$97,500 after taking salary changes and non-controllable expenses such as utilities into consideration. The division is projecting to have 1548 students (1488 full-time equivalent students) in September 2020.
- The budget over budget increase is 0.4%.
- With an increase in property assessment of 6.14%, the division's Mill Rate will decrease 3.76% to 10.16 mills.
- School taxes will change depending on the property class and change in assessment on that property.

Good afternoon,

As you may already know, the PSCS Transition from FleetNet is planned from April 2020 to May 2021. The PSCS Project team has been working collaboratively with the Office of the Fire Commissioner to develop the specific transition schedule for all Fire Departments within this timeline. The overall approach will be to transition fire departments by Mutual Aid District, in an effort to ensure interoperability throughout the transition period. We are also working closely with Brandon 911 as they start preparing to supporting the fire departments on PSCS throughout transition.

Below are the four key upcoming dates to plan for:

### 1. Place Initial Radio Order: March 1, 2020

Work with your Bell Partner of choice to identify the best radio for your operational needs and place your initial order. *Note that you will not have to pay for your radio equipment until radios are programmed and delivered to you.* 

### 2. Determine Programming Requirements & Testing: May 2020 – September 2020

OFC has been developing the standard programming requirements for all Municipal Fire radios. Bell/Bell Partner will ensure thorough testing of radio programming prior to your transition.

### 3. User Training: June 2020 – October 2020

Bell will be conducting train-the-trainer sessions and provide necessary curriculum for end user training.

### 4. Fire Transition: September 2020 – November 2020

Bell/Bell Partner will program your radios and schedule installation/delivery with your department.

It is essential that all fire departments make every effort possible to follow the schedule that is put in place. Your participation is required to ensure that your department is transitioned at the same time as your Mutual Aid District. A detailed schedule, by department, will be developed and shared in the early new year.

Please continue to work with your Bell Partner over the next couple of months to ensure your initial order is placed by March 1, 2020.

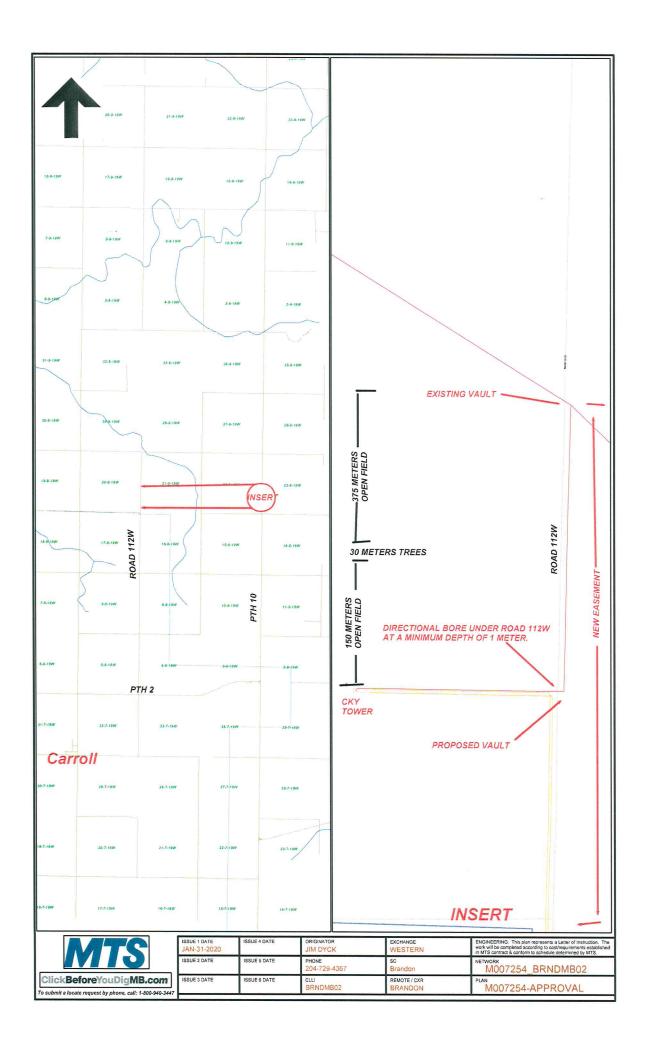

### Wawanesa hydro generation

Late last year I was made aware that the dam in Wawanesa was scheduled to be rebuilt or refurbished in the near future. This has several implications for Oakland-Wawanesa as well as some possible opportunities. One of my interests is in renewable energy and so I did some investigation into the possibility of generating hydroelectricity from the Wawanesa dam to provide the municipality with a new stream of income and perhaps provide emergency power to utilities in the event of power interruptions.

Hydroelectric generation has expanded in recent years beyond traditional massive dam projects. Generation equipment is available for what is often termed "micro hydro" or "small hydro" that runs the gamut of small pocket sized generators that can be dropped in a stream to charge your phone to 30 Megawatt (MW) systems that could power much of western Manitoba. Most common public generation systems are in the range of 20 Kilowatt (KW) to perhaps a few MW. This is becoming common in Europe, some remote areas of Asia and is gaining popularity in the western US and British Columbia. Some of Manitoba Hydro's older dams qualify as small hydro, and Alberta is doing some small scale hydro generation, including a system that generates power from the flow of an irrigation canal.

Manitoba Hydro has a program for small scale electric generation (usually solar) that allows customers to generate electricity (up to 200 KW) which reduces the customers bill. The customer does not receive a cheque from MH, but excess electricity is credited to their account to offset future bills. Currently, MH pays approximately \$.04 per Kilowatt hour (kw/h) though this price had been set at approximately \$.08 per kw/h for customers who applied under a program that ended in the spring of 2018.

Generation potential is determined by the volume of the flow of the river and the head (distance the water falls). My guess is that the potential of the Wawanesa dam is approximately 1 MW. The variability of flow in dry periods makes me think that 10 months of generation might be average for a year.

One MW for an hour results in \$40 at the \$.04 kw/h rate or \$80 at the higher rate. This results in a value of \$960 - \$1920 a day. Over a 300 day generation year that translates into \$288,000 to \$576,000 per year.

I have very little information on the cost of a generation system. I did contact Natel Energy and they said that 5 of their turbines would generate approximately .875 MW on a river of this size and the cost of the turbines would be about US\$3.5 million and that the other costs of such a project are often 2-3 times the cost of the turbines.

I decided to put this to council members to see if there is any desire to continue investigating this. I have no idea if a municipality is allowed to sell electricity, invest in that type of infrastructure, or if Manitoba Hydro would be at all interested in a project such as this. MH has projected that their export rates will nearly triple in the next 15 years suggesting that they might be open to projects such as this, that has a low social and environmental impact. That they canceled the solar subsidies suggests they might not, though hydro is much more dependable than solar generation. If the provincial government got behind this as something of a demonstration project and instructed Manitoba Infrastructure and Manitoba Hydro to assist in all ways (the solar subsidies under the cancelled program essentially paid for all the panels) costs could be significantly reduced. At the above costs, It doesn't pencil out at even the \$.08 rate. If capital costs are greatly reduced, such a project could conceivably contribute yearly net income well into six figures.

A much smaller and cheaper system may be possible to power water and sewage pumps to provide a small yearly savings and could provide service during power outage though I have not done any investigation into this.

If any action on this was to take place, the obvious time would be while the province is working on the dam and water is being diverted around the dam site. I don't get the sense that work on the dam would take place this year.

I look forward to any input on this.

Election Report regarding Election Finance Statements

As you are aware, there is a requirement in *The Municipal Act* that all registered candidates for municipal elections must file the required Election Finance Statement with the CAO within 210 days after Election Day. For the 2019 by-election, that deadline was January 16, 2020.

The obligations for registered candidates are well documented in the Candidates Guidebook prepared by Manitoba Municipal Relations and also included in the Campaign and Expense By-law, both of which were included in candidates' packages provided to each potential candidate.

Follow up letters were sent to all candidates on July 5, 2019 outlining the requirement to submit their statements by January 16, 2020. An email was sent on January 16 reminding candidates that the deadline was that day.

There was one registered candidate who was not elected who failed to file the necessary statements by the deadline and *The Municipal Act* states:

### Failure of other registered candidates to file

<u>93.16(3)</u> Where an individual who is registered as a candidate in an election and who is not nominated, withdraws, or is not elected in the election, fails to comply with section 93.12 (filing election finance statement), the individual is disqualified from being nominated for or elected as a member of council until after the next general election.

In accordance with the above, Glen Kirby will be disqualified from being nominated for or elected as a member of council until after the 2022 general election.

This report is submitted for your information and a copy will be retained on the Municipal Election file.

#### What is the Program?

One-time provincial funding support of up to \$3 million to municipalities to support/enhance municipal capacity and capability to prepare for a possible 2020 spring flood emergency and to build resiliency for future floods.

The goal of the program is to reduce adverse financial impacts and property damage that could be caused by potential spring flooding in 2020.

# Program Highlights:

- Successful applicants will be reimbursed for up to 100% of approved flood preparedness and/or resiliency projects or equipment costs.
- Applicants may be approved for eligible expenditures made between November 25, 2019 and March 31, 2020.
- Maximum available funding per municipality will be determined based upon the total value of all approved proposals. The estimated maximum funding amount is \$150,000 per individual municipal proposal, or up to \$150,000 per municipality participating in a joint proposal with other municipalities. Consideration will be given for funding of up to \$500,000 for the City of Winnipeg should flood risk warrant additional investment.
- Provincial funding can be supplemented by municipal funding for larger projects. If an
  applicant is approved for up to \$150,000 of provincial funding on a project that will cost more
  than that, the applicant must demonstrate the ability and willingness to pay the additional
  amount.
- Evaluation of proposals will take into account a number of criteria including flood risk; ability
  of the proposal to enhance emergency preparedness, improve flood response capacity and
  build resiliency for future flood events; regional benefits; and the nature of the proposed
  purchase.

# Who can Apply?

All Manitoba municipalities may apply.

Joint applications are encouraged if they demonstrate a coordinated effort to work across municipal boundaries.

## What Purchases are Eligible?

To be eligible, proposals must:

 Have a clear objective aimed at enhancing flood preparedness and reducing flood risk in the municipality

- Build on existing emergency preparedness arrangements in the municipality's emergency plan (a municipality may apply for support to update its existing emergency plan within the available time)
- Not request support for a project or equipment purchase for which the applicant already has secured other provincial or federal funding sources
- Include only projects and equipment purchases for which, if approved, the proof of purchase must be dated as occurring between November 25, 2019 and March 31, 2020.

# Eligible costs include:

- Cost of purchasing flood-fighting equipment
- Cost of flood preparedness/emergency response training for municipal employees who
  are expected to be deployed for flood-fighting (i.e. cost of instructors, rental of facilities,
  equipment and supplies, travel, food, and accommodation in accordance with municipal
  per diem rates allocated for travel)
- Costs for the development, coordination and exercising of emergency plans including risk, vulnerability or hazard assessments
- Consultant fees, printing, and other out-of-pocket expenses that are directly tied to a
  deliverable or activity under the proposed project

## Ineligible costs include:

- Costs related to events and equipment which are considered to be the routine responsibility of first responder agencies such as police, fire and ambulance
- Salaries or benefits of officials who would normally be expected to provide the service called for in a proposed project as part of their routine duty
- Administrative costs that are not directly related to the specific proposed project or material purchase. Each recipient is expected to absorb the routine costs of doing business.
- Inflation allowance or contingency costs
- 911 emergency systems
- Public warning systems

Please see the attached Appendix for a sample list of eligible items.

Manitoba may impose further restrictions and/or adjust maximum funding allocations beyond those outlined, based on demand.

### Proposals:

To be considered for funding support, municipalities are asked to complete a program application form. Proposals should include:

- Proposal title
- Description of the project including what funding would be used for and how the project or material purchase will enhance municipal preparedness
- Demonstration of regional benefit and collaboration
- Value of the project or equipment purchase, including quantities of items to be obtained and cost estimates
- Information on any possible municipal contribution to the total cost for projects or purchases that may exceed maximum provincial support
- Statement on how the proposal aligns with the applicant's existing emergency management/preparedness plan
- Statement on how the provincial contribution to the project or equipment purchase will be recognized
- Confirmation that proposed procurement aligns with existing municipal procurement policies
- A copy of a resolution indicating Council support for the proposal
- Certification and sign-off of the proposal by the appropriate municipal staff

### **Evaluation:**

Evaluation of proposals will take into account a number of criteria including flood risk; ability of the proposal to enhance emergency preparedness, improve flood response capacity and build resiliency for future flood events; regional benefits; and the nature of the proposed purchase.

An advisory panel consisting of representatives from the Association of Manitoba Municipalities, Winnipeg Metropolitan Region and the Province (including the departments of Municipal Relations, Infrastructure and Agriculture and Resource Development) will review and evaluate proposals.

## Appendix - Examples of eligible materials, equipment and services

This non-exhaustive list includes examples of materials, equipment and services that would be considered eligible for reimbursement under this program. Proposals need not be limited to items on this list.

#### Equipment

- 1. Pumps and ancillary equipment such as hoses, including high volume pumps (i.e. trailer mounted pumps)
- 2. Flood protection equipment including water filled flood barriers and ancillary equipment (pumps, hoses, etc.)
- 3. Emergency Response Trailers
  - a. for flood protection, including water filled barriers (as above), pumps, lighting kits, ancillary equipment; or
  - b. for environmental response, including water filled barriers similar to above but for spill response and containment, pumps, lighting kits, ancillary equipment
- 4. General purpose trailers for movement of flood or emergency response equipment.
- 5. Lighting kits (trailer mounted) for emergency site illumination during low-light conditions or for security
- 6. Generators (portable and trailer mounted)
- Equipment for Emergency Operation Centres (EOCs) and Incident Command Posts (ICPs) to include whiteboards, smartboards, computer equipment, displays, storage boxes, telecommunications equipment (including phones, etc., but not including land-mobile radios/FleetNet)
- 8. Sandbag fill machines (small to mid-sized)
- 9. Sandbags, super sandbags, etc.
- 10. Water rescue equipment for emergency services (boats, trailers, motors, ropes, block and tackle, lifejackets, lighting kits, etc.)
- 11. Steaming equipment for culvert thawing
- 12. Portable shelters/tents for emergency shelter during flood evacuations for flood response personnel
- 13. Portable heating systems to complement portable shelters
- 14. Tools including chain saws, cement cutting saws, shovels, etc.
- 15. Road closure barriers or materials to produce them (wood, paint, reflective markers, etc.)

### Services

- 1. Various engineering services
- 2. Emergency Management and Incident Command System training
- 3. Emergency plan development
- 4. Exercise planning and conduct
- 5. Survey services (i.e. professional survey services to confirm property, road, and dike elevations, to determine properties at risk)
- 6. Security consultants for creating security plans that can be implemented during evacuations or when needing to control access
