

The above noted bylaw has been circulated to government departments and agencies for review and comment following first reading. This report summarizes provincial departmental responses received. There are no provincial objections to the bylaw. All comments are attached in Appendix A. Council should provide a copy of this report and copies of all comments received to the development proponent for review and consideration at the public hearing.

Manitoba Municipal Relations - Community Planning Branch - This amendment proposes to re-zone the above referenced lands located in the northeast former of the municipality in Pt. SW36-08-17WPM from "CR" Conservation and Recreation Zone to "AG" Agriculture General Zone. Council approval of this zoning amendment will allow the proponent (Mr. Cale Jefferies) to subdivide the subject lands and build a single unit dwelling on the site for his family's own use. The Brandon Community Planning Office has no concerns with the proposed zoning amendment as it brings the zoning of the subject lands into general compliance with the Oakland-Wawanesa Municipal Development Plan.

Manitoba Infrastructure – Highway Planning and Design Branch – The Branch does not object to the proposed zoning amendment. However, the department has no record of permits for the existing access onto PR No. 340. Manitoba Infrastructure will therefore require the owners/proponent to obtain a permit from Manitoba Infrastructure to legalize the existing access and for the intensification of use of the access. We understand that there will be an easement agreement across the adjacent property. Therefore, included in the permit will be the declaration of right-of-way for the continued use and maintenance of the existing access to the subject property. Permission from the landowners will be required. Please be advised that through the permitting process, there may be a need to relocate the access away from the bridge."

**Historic Resources Branch** – The Branch does not not object to the rezoning but has concerns that development of the subject lands has potential to impact heritage resources. Therefore, prior to development of the site, the proponent must at his own expense retain a qualified archaeological consultant to complete a Historic Resources Impact Assessment (HRIA).

#### **Next Steps:**

Between first and second reading of a zoning bylaw, council most hold a public hearing (set for March 16, 2021). If there are no local or provincial objections raised at the required public hearing, council may choose to give the bylaw second and third reading after it closes the hearing. If objections are made orally or in writing at the hearing and council gives the bylaw second reading with outstanding objections, it must provide written notice of the bylaw having received second reading to objectors. This is outlined in section 77(3) and (4) of *The Planning Act*. If council receives several objections, as identified in 77(5), and meets the definition of sufficient objections under the Act (73.1(1-4)), council must then issue notice of second reading. If sufficient objections are received in response to notice of second reading, council must then refer the bylaw and objections to the Municipal Board.

Further to your e-mail regarding the above noted zoning amendment, the Manitoba Historic Resources Branch (HRB) has examined the location in conjunction with Branch records for areas of potential concern. This property was initially examined by HRB under Development plan amendment No. 04-2020 (AAS-20-15984). The property in question is located on the lower terrace of the Assiniboine River, which has numerous previously recorded Pre-European Contact Indigenous settlements, as well as being in close proximity to documented fur trade posts such as Brandon House, Assiniboine House, and Fort La Souris. A pre-impact assessment was conducted and determined that an HRIA would be required before development. Therefore, the Historic Resources Branch has concerns that any future planned development within the area has the potential to impact heritage resources.

Under Section 12(2) of *The Heritage Resources Act*, if the Minister of Sport, Culture and Heritage has reason to believe that heritage resources or human remains are known, or thought likely to be present, on lands that are to be developed, then the owner/developer is required to conduct at his/her own expense, a heritage resource impact assessment (HRIA) and mitigation, if necessary, prior to the project's start.

The developer must contract a qualified archaeological consultant to conduct a Heritage Resources Impact assessment (HRIA) of the proposed development location, in order to identify and assess any heritage resources that may be negatively impacted by development. If desirable, the Branch will work with the developer/land owners and its consultant to draw up terms of reference for this project.

In response to your email dated January 14, 2021, we have reviewed the above noted Zoning By-law amendment. The intent is to re-designate the subject land from Conservation and Recreation Area to Agricultural General Area to allow for the location of a rural residence. The area being re-designated is essentially land locked. However, we understand the owners propose a cross-easement agreement with the adjacent land to utilize an existing access onto PR 340.

Based on all available information, we do not object to the approval of this amendment.

We refer to comments made by Jeff Dinella on August 13, 2020 in regards to DPA 04-2020.

"However, we have no record of permits for the existing access onto PR 340. Therefore, we require the owners/proponent to obtain a permit from Manitoba Infrastructure to legalize the existing access and for the intensification of use of the access. We understand that there will be an easement agreement across the adjacent property. Therefore, included in the permit will be the declaration of right-of-way for the continued use and maintenance of the existing access to the subject property. Permission from the landowners will be required. Please be advised that through the permitting process, there may be a need to relocate the access away from the bridge."



Re: Please take a moment to protect Canadian youth from becoming addicted to nicotine vaping products.

Health Canada is proposing new regulations to limit the amount of nicotine in vaping products and the public consultation ends on Thursday, March 4.

If approved, the proposed <u>Health Canada proposed regulations</u> will reduce the amount of nicotine that can be put in vaping liquids to 20 mg/ml. This is the same standard that is in place in the European Union and several other countries. It is a measure which Canada's <u>provincial medical officers</u> of health called for last year.

The absence of such a limit has contributed to Canada's vaping market becoming dominated by high-nicotine liquids that are used by young people.

<u>Half of vapers are under 25 years of age in Canada,</u> compared with only 8% in the U.K. And in comparison with the U.K., there are proportionately ten times more 'never smokers' using these products in Canada, and half as many 'former smokers'.

**February 18, 2021** - The Association of Manitoba Municipalities (AMM) concluded meetings today with a number of local Councils in the Interlake

District. The AMM makes it a priority to meet one-on-one with each of its member municipalities at least once during each four-year election cycle.

"Our members are anticipating further revenue losses in 2021 due to COVID-19," stated AMM President Kam Blight. "It is vital that municipalities receive all necessary support, including additional emergency operating funding from the provincial and federal governments to offset these losses."

"During our discussions, broadband connectivity was a key theme raised by many members. Municipalities are counting on the provincial broadband strategy to boost connectivity and economic development as they look to recover from COVID-19," noted Cheryl Smith, Reeve of the RM of St. Laurent and AMM Interlake District Director.

"Several Councils also expressed concerns with the lack of approvals for local infrastructure projects under the Investing in Canada Infrastructure Program (ICIP). Funds should be advanced to municipal partners as soon as possible to allow planning and construction to commence without delay," added Kelly Cook, Councillor from the City of Selkirk and AMM Interlake District Director.

The AMM delegation met with the RM of Woodlands, Town of Arborg, RM of Gimli, Town of Stonewall, RM of Grahamdale, Town of Teulon, RM of Rockwood, RM of St. Andrews, RM of West St. Paul and RM of West Interlake.

Members of the AMM delegation included President Kam Blight, Vice-Presidents Brad Saluk and Chris Ewen, Interlake District Directors Cheryl Smith and Kelly Cook, and Executive Director Denys Volkov.

This letter is to confirm the rate increase for basic and complex firefighting payments made by Manitoba Public Insurance.

As outlined in our previous letters, these rates are currently adjusted annually at March 1<sup>st</sup> of each year based on the prior year's CPI plus 1%. Effective March 1, 2021, the basic call rate will increase from \$883 to \$896. The complex call rate will increase from \$1179 to \$1197 based on the 2020 Manitoba CPI rate of 0.51% (resulting in a 1.51% increase).

These new rates will come into effect for losses occurring on March 1, 2021 and later. I would ask that you inform the Association members of this upcoming change.

Along with the rate increase, our invoice form will continue to be available on our Partners website (forms section). We would encourage all Municipalities to continue to use this form and send them electronically to <a href="mailto:firefightinginvoices@mpi.mb.ca">firefightinginvoices@mpi.mb.ca</a>. We believe this will increase response time and reduce administrative work for both Municipalities and Manitoba Public Insurance.

While the AMM Board maintains the policy of confidentiality regarding ongoing discussions with the provincial government and stakeholders, we are pleased to share some of the topics with you.

#### Rural Manitoba Economic Development (RMED) Corporation

While the COVID-19 pandemic has resulted in significant economic challenges, it is vital that the Province follow through with the provincial commitment to open a new

Economic Development Office in rural Manitoba to build strategic capacity. As municipalities are uniquely positioned to lead our province's economic recovery, rural Manitoba's economic future relies on a supportive business friendly environment that acknowledges the important role business plays in our communities. Thus, we are pleased to see that the Rural Manitoba Economic Development (RMED) Corporation will be operational by Spring 2021.

The AMM has long advocated for a one-stop shop in rural Manitoba to help build strategic capacity by reducing red tape and foster economic growth in rural communities. For more information regarding the RMED focus and objectives, please click <u>HERE</u>.

Agriculture Resource Development and Manitoba Agricultural Services Corporation (MASC) Office Closures

On January 6, 2021, the Hon. Blaine Pedersen, Minister of Agriculture and Resource Development (ARD), announced that the Manitoba government is launching <u>a new rural service delivery model to modernize services provided to clients.</u>

The AMM understands the needs and delivery methods for agricultural services continues to evolve, however we believe any changes to rural service delivery, including the closure of offices, should be communicated to local municipalities well in advance of any government announcements so communities can plan and prepare accordingly. While we appreciate that no job losses will occur due to these changes, we continue to discuss concerns raised by our members with the minister and departmental staff. If you can identify any specific services that will be impacted due to these closures, please contact the <u>AMM office</u>.

As new service centres will be created and more services will become available online, our members have raised concerns about increased travel distances to offices, especially as Manitobans are encouraged to stay within their own communities. The current service delivery model lacks office representation in the western side of the province and assumes that all areas throughout the province have sufficient access to broadband Internet connectivity. Given the ongoing pandemic and push for e-services, we continue to call on the provincial government to expedite its broadband Internet strategy to improve connectivity among Manitobans.

#### Provincial Waste Management & Recycling Review

On January 21, 2021, the Hon. Sarah Guillemard, Minister of Conservation and Climate announced that the province launched a comprehensive review of waste management and recycling in Manitoba. As the AMM is committed to advancing practical solutions

to address challenges in waste diversion and recycling, we welcome the provincial commitment to <u>comprehensively review recycling and waste management in</u> Manitoba.

The existing approach to recycling and waste diversion has been in place for over a decade. Thus, we welcome an approach that will support a mandate to modernize the regulatory and programming frameworks for waste diversion and recycling and to drive innovations with the private sector and municipalities in Manitoba. The review will include a policy landscape and best practice scan, a regulatory review of the Waste Reduction and Prevention Act, an evaluation of Manitoba stewardships programs and the waste reduction and recycling support levy and a stakeholder and public engagement to inform recommendations.

On February 5<sup>th</sup>, the AMM met with the project team, Dillon Consulting, responsible for leading the review to discuss all active municipal files that pertain to recycling, landfills and waste management. As the final report is expected to be delivered to the Manitoba government later this spring, the AMM will provide more information as it becomes available.





March 5, 2021 - The Association of Manitoba Municipalities (AMM) concluded meetings yesterday with a number of local Councils in the Eastern District. The AMM makes it a priority to meet one-on-one with each of its member municipalities at least once during each four-year election cycle.

"During the discussions, several members raised concerns about the federal government's proposed legislation regarding new firearms measures," stated AMM President Kam Blight. "The AMM will be raising these concerns with the Federation of Canadian Municipalities (FCM) next week since any new measures should be based on a nationwide approach to improving public safety."

"As the new provincial legislative session started this week, many Councils expressed support for the AMM's call for amendments to Bill 37. It is essential that the scope of appeals be clarified and mechanisms to mitigate frivolous appeals be developed to not delay municipal land-use decisions," noted Stan Toews, Reeve of the RM of Hanover and AMM Eastern District Director.

"Municipalities are also leaders when it comes to waste diversion and recycling. Our members welcomed the provincial review currently underway as it aims to modernize programming frameworks and supports to local communities," added Melanie Parent, Councillor from the RM of Piney and AMM Eastern District Director.

The AMM delegation met with the RM of Alexander, Town of Niverville, RM of East St. Paul, Town of Lac du Bonnet, RM of Piney, Town of Powerview-Pine Falls, RM of Springfield, RM of St. Clements, RM of Stuartburn, RM of Victoria Beach, and RM of Taché.

Members of the AMM delegation included President Kam Blight, Vice-Presidents Brad Saluk and Chris Ewen, Eastern District Directors Stan Toews and Melanie Parent, and Executive Director Denys Volkov.






