Dear Friend,

When Kids Help Phone needed support to launch our ambitious national texting service for youth, you answered the call.

That's why my heart is so full of gratitude today as I share the results of the launch of *Crisis Text Line powered by Kids Help Phone* as Canada's first and only national, bilingual, 24/7 texting service. It's not very often you see the outcome of a new initiative right away, but that's exactly what happened.

Before I go any further, I want to say that you're an incredibly valued friend to Kids Help Phone, and to all the young people in Nesbitt and across the country who rely on us. Did you know you've been giving for 8 years? Your generosity is having a profound impact on youth.

Because of you, we went from pilot program to national roll-out in nine months, tripling our texting service capacity in some regions. From 125 text conversations on our first day, we logged a peak of 700 conversations in a single day.

That's tens of thousands of scared and distressed young people who have a trusted place to turn, all because of *you!* Thanks to you, 39,631 young people were able to reach out via text when they needed help, totalling over 71,858 conversations.

You might remember the 17-year-old young man I wrote to you about previously, who experienced horrific flashbacks of childhood abuse while sitting in history class. Your generosity meant he was able to text and get immediate help while sitting in the classroom.

Because of you, youth across Canada know they can chat confidentially with a trained, volunteer Crisis Responder. Anytime. Anywhere. For any issue.

How important is text-based support to young people? Almost one in four of the kids who text us do so because of suicidal thoughts. Crisis Responders also hear from youth dealing with anxiety, relationship struggles and feelings of isolation.

You'll recall that we promised to do three things with your generous support: 1) to train **more** volunteers; 2) to offer **bilingual** texting support; and 3) to **raise awareness** among youth about the service. **You've enabled us to hit every mark!**

Because of you, we've trained 900 volunteers across Canada. Our bilingual texting service is now available 24/7, year-round. And within days of launch, access to our service rose dramatically. You can read all about it in the report I've enclosed with this letter.

Because there is no need for data, an app or even an Internet connection, we can reach young people, even in the most remote communities. When you can't be there in person, de-escalation via texting can be the difference between life and death.

Crisis Text Line powered by Kids Help Phone is also the first helpline in Canada to use technology that can triage conversations by severity, rather than by chronology. When someone texts, the technology analyzes the words that the young person uses and a computer assesses whether the situation is high-risk.

We have an astounding 90% accuracy rate for predicting if conversations are going to be about suicide, and for identifying who might need an 'active rescue' – meaning that a volunteer connects them with local emergency services who can help them in-person. This means we're reaching the young people in the most severe crises first. *You* are the reason we can offer this life-saving technology.

Here's what we've learned along the way: working with youth means we need to keep up with ever-changing technology. With your support, Kids Help Phone has a track record of creating innovative services and delivering them in novel ways to meet the needs of young people. We must continue to shape service delivery and ensure youth are receiving the most effective, timely interventions possible. **Donors like you are some of the most caring and generous folks in Canada.**

As champions of the only national helpline for youth, you are the lifeline young people need. You are the listening ear, the friendly face at the end of the day and the reason young people can believe in a brighter tomorrow.



I'm so glad that Crisis Text Line powered by Kids Help Phone came about. I think it's a really great way for people to approach and get help and start talking about things.

One text can save a life


I still don't know why I reached out to Kids Help Phone that day, but I'm sure glad I did. Otherwise, I wouldn't still be here.

The details are too much to share, but let's just say I had good reason to give up on life. I had it all planned out—the bridge I was going to jump off, even the bus I'd take to get there.

But something inside me told me to give Kids Help Phone a try. I was on the bus, surrounded by people, and didn't want to make a phone call. So I texted instead. The counsellor on the other end was so great. She could tell that I was scared, that I wasn't sure this was what I really wanted to do. She called the police so they could meet me when I got off the bus. She kept me calm by texting with me. She showed me I wasn't alone. And that was enough to change my mind-and save my life.

Thank you for your correspondence wherein you request that, once additional information on the Kindergarten to Grade 12 Review became available, a further opportunity to provide input would be provided to the Council and The Southwest Horizon School Division.

As announced on January 23, 2019, a comprehensive review of the Kindergarten to Grade 12 education system is taking place over the course of the next several months. The review is led by a Commission and will focus on a variety of topics such as:

- improving student outcomes and accountability related to student learning;
- education governance, including the roles and responsibilities of school boards and of division administrations; and
- sustainability of, management of, and accountability for financial resources which support that system.

As part of the review, there was a consultation process to engage parents, education professionals, subject matter experts, students, stakeholder groups including school boards and municipal councils, and any Manitoban interested in sharing their ideas for improving Kindergarten to Grade 12 education in our province. Thousands of Manitobans have participated in the online survey, and many hundreds attended the public hearings in several communities around the province. The feedback generated will be critical to the work of the Commission. I understand that The Southwest Horizon School Division registered to attend one of the K-12 review workshops.

It is government's expectation that, with input from citizens and organizations across the province, the review will generate recommendations that will modernize the elementary/secondary school system and support high quality learning opportunities for all students.

Details about the review will continue to be available at www.edu.gov.mb.ca/educationreview. This website will be updated regularly to keep Manitobans informed.

It has been brought to the attention of Council that a ratepayer believes the weed spraying plan and the chemicals (2-4D) that we are using are incorrect and are a waste of time and money.

I attended the Manitoba Weed Supervisors meeting in March to be refreshed and learn about spraying in a Rural Municipality. As Weed Supervisor I drove around the Municipality and looked at what needs to be sprayed for weeds. The spraying plan will target leafy spurge, rag weeds, pig weeds, annual sow thistle, and burdocks and 2-4D is my herbicide of choice. Canadian thistle and milkweed are present in lower amounts but are not on the 2-4D label.

The reason I chose to use 2-4D over other chemicals, such as dicambas and MCPA products, is that these products easily lift or volatilize and drift into neighboring crops. Drifting into crops such as soybeans and canola and can cause severe injury. There could be consequences for using these products and I don't want to put Council in that position.

Another disadvantage of these other products, Dicambas and MCPA, is that they only kill the top growth of the thistle species and the risk and reward for using such products would be poor judgment.

Milkweed is very hard to kill and can only be killed by a non-selective herbicide such as glyphosate or Amitrol which can only be spot sprayed. If we have a major break out of milkweed we will act accordingly.

2-4D can control leafy spurge if sprayed at budding or flowering, it suppresses the plant and it will not produce seed. It needs to be sprayed every year to keep the weeds under control as it is a Tier 2 noxious weed. The current spray plan will not eradicate leafy spurge, but it will stop it from spreading further.

There are two other great chemicals that are on the market, Grazon and Tordon. While they are very effective, they are cost prohibitive and have negative environmental impacts such as leaching into the soil. These products must be used with caution near waterways and aquifers many of which are within our Municipality.

As Weed Supervisor, I feel that the spray plan currently implemented will be both effective for weed mitigation while being cost effective. The previous weed supervisor used 2-4D and didn't have problem with it or see it as a waste of money. Many other neighboring Municipalities use the same chemical.

I have consulted with 2 very highly regarded and experienced agronomists and they are of the same opinion. In my opinion, if someone says the current plan is a complete waste of time and money I would suggest that they need to do a little more homework on the effectiveness of 2-4D and realize that we have to work within the budget that Council has approved.

As Weed Supervisor of the Municipality of Oakland Wawanesa I take full responsibility for the spraying plan implemented and the decisions made. For someone to make accusations of our Public Works Manager's education and experience is false as the responsibility and decisions do not fall on him.

The main weeds that should be sprayed for are Canada Thistle, Leafy Spurge and Milkweed. 2-4-D will give minimal control of Canada Thistle, but does nothing to control Leafy Spurge and Milkweed. The result is 26K budget wasted. PW manager has no education or experience in Weed Control, what a complete waste of time and money.
