AMM resumes 2020 Municipal Visits, tours Westman

July 24, 2020 - The AMM toured the Western District of the province this week and met with local Councils from a number of municipalities. The AMM makes it a priority to visit each of its member municipalities at least once during each four-year election cycle.

"As we continue to navigate the new COVID-19 reality, we were very pleased to resume our 2020 municipal visits in accordance with social distancing practices. Meeting one-on-one with local Councils as well as discussing the challenges and opportunities they are facing is invaluable, as it allows AMM to more effectively advocate on behalf of all municipalities," stated AMM President Ralph Groening.

"During a time of economic uncertainty, taking advantage of our short construction season by delivering infrastructure projects was a commonly discussed theme. As municipalities are uniquely positioned to lead the economic recovery of our province, we continue to call on our provincial and federal partners to expedite the approval of municipal applications under Phase 2 of the Investing in Canada Infrastructure Program (ICIP)," noted Rhonda Coupland, Councillor of the Municipality of Boissevain-Morton and AMM Western District Director.

"Since municipalities fuel economic development, we also heard significant concerns regarding Bill 48: The Planning Amendment and City of Winnipeg Charter Amendment Act. Local insights are extremely beneficial as it helps the AMM push for legislative changes responsive to municipal needs while respecting local autonomy and decision-making," added Stuart Olmstead, Mayor of the Town of Carberry and AMM Western District Director.

The impact of the June and July heavy rains that caused significant infrastructure damage in several communities also featured prominently in the discussions along with increased financial pressures on municipal budgets due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

The AMM delegation visited the RM of Argyle, Municipality of Killarney-Turtle Mountain, Municipality of Brenda-Waskada, Town of Melita, Municipality of Two Borders, RM of Pipestone, RM of Wallace-Woodworth, RM of Elton, RM of Cornwallis, and City of Brandon.







August 4, 2020 - In partnership with the Royal Canadian Mounted Police (RCMP) in Manitoba and the Provincial-Municipal Justice Advisory Committee (PMJAC), please be advised that the following RCMP reporting templates have been developed to enhance communication between local Councils and the RCMP using a standardized approach across Manitoba.

"While public safety is among the top concerns for municipalities, information sharing between local Councils and RCMP is essential to ensure local communities remain

safe. These templates are an excellent resource to be used during the reporting and planning processes, and they can also be tailored to the needs of municipalities based on local priorities," noted AMM Executive Director Denys Volkov.

"Community safety is a top priority for Manitoba's provincial police force," said Chief Superintendent Rob Hill of the Manitoba RCMP. "These reporting templates are a valuable tool in ensuring that the information we share about crime trends and concerns in any specific community is accurate and up-to-date."

The AMM understands that the majority of RCMP commanders posted across Manitoba are already using these templates to report to local Councils. This information is being resent as a reminder given the rotation of RCMP officers and turnover of municipal officials following the last election.

In closing, the AMM wishes to thank both the RCMP and PMJAC for co-developing these reporting templates as well as encourages all local Councils to review the templates with their local RCMP detachments.

August 7, 2020 - The AMM toured the Interlake District of the province this week and met with local Councils from a number of municipalities. The AMM makes it a priority to visit each of its member municipalities at least once during each four-year election cycle.

"Meeting with local Councils one-on-one is very important, perhaps now more than ever given COVID-19," stated AMM President Ralph Groening. "While all of our members are dealing with increased pressures due to this new reality, municipal officials continue to be on the front lines of this pandemic delivering essential services and protecting local communities."

"During our meetings, we certainly gained greater insights into the challenges and opportunities facing the Interlake District. Our members clearly want to lead Manitoba's economic recovery, and thus many Councils expressed their desire to move infrastructure projects forward in partnership with the provincial and federal

governments," noted Cheryl Smith, Reeve of the RM of St. Laurent and AMM Interlake District Director.

"Protecting local autonomy and reducing red tape was also a key theme discussed at all meetings. 



Dear Reeves, Mayors and CAOs:

The province of Manitoba has had one of the most robust pandemic responses in Canada. Case positivity rates remain lower than neighbouring jurisdictions, testing volumes have increased, and public health officials continue to identify cases and conduct contact tracing investigations quickly.

I would like to thank each of you for your efforts to prevent the spread of COVID-19 in your communities. By working together, we have successfully followed the advice of our Chief Provincial Public Health Officer, Dr. Brent Roussin, and Manitobans have managed to keep each other safe.

The COVID-19 pandemic will pose a significant public health challenge for some time to come. As we approach cold and flu season, we are implementing measures which we believe will serve Manitobans well, increase public confidence, and support municipalities.

To give Manitobans an even greater level of detail on COVID-19 cases we are providing more specific geographic information related to cases. Effective August 13, 2020, our government will begin reporting cases by health district, instead of by regional health authority. The cities of Winnipeg and Brandon will be reported as single districts.

Reporting at this level provides a balance between the request for greater information and ensuring the privacy of Manitobans who contract COVID-19. Effective August 13, 2020, please visit www.gov.mb.ca/covid19/updates/cases.html to view the map/breakdown of cases on our COVID-19 dashboard, which is updated daily. This is part of our government's more comprehensive and transparent approach to reporting.

The goal of any public health response is to use the least restrictive means possible to keep people safe. It is still possible that some of the restrictions that were relaxed as part of the Restoring Safe Services plan may need to be reinstated, or for existing restrictions to be further relaxed. By identifying smaller health regions, we will also be able to assess local information from each of our various communities, and will be able to relax or reinstate restrictions in more precisely defined geographical areas. In other words, local restrictions will be based on local data.

Thank you for your continued efforts to reduce the risk and spread of COVID-19 in Manitoba. As Dr. Roussin often notes, we are all in this together. By following the fundamental public health advice he's given us from the beginning, by washing our hands, observing physical distancing, and staying home when we are sick, we will continue to keep Manitoba one of the safest jurisdictions in the world.



Covid-19 Provincial Calls

These bi-weekly calls continue. With increased numbers in the Prairie Mountain Health district, particularly in Brandon, consideration is being given to what this might look like if one of our staff test positive, as that would effectively shut down the office.

Property Matters

There have been 19 development permits taken out this year to the end of July. This is in comparison to 14 in 2019. There are also two Development Plan amendments on the go, which will be followed by Zoning By-law amendments, which might include adding a new zoning classification of RR10, for rural residential lots with a minimum of 10 acres and which would allow for the keeping of livestock as permitted, rather than conditional. Both Development Plan amendments are being pursued to allow for subdivision applications.

Financial Plan and Budget

The Public Hearing for the 2020 Financial Plan was held on August 4 following which the Tax Levy By-law was adopted. Documents have been uploaded for Provincial review and the preparations of tax bills. It is anticipated that tax bills will be provided to the Office by August 24, following which staff will mail to residents. Please note that in-person payment is not being recommended. Residents can contact the office for other payment options.

Review of Emergency Plan

I have worked with the Emergency Co-ordinator on the preparation of a draft Emergency Plan. This will be reviewed with Council following the Council meeting for additional input, for adoption at the September meeting of Council. Covid-19 permitting, a joint table top exercise with the RM of Cornwallis will take place this fall.

Animal By-law

I have begun work on a draft Animal By-law for the Municipality.

Meetings with Members of Council

Discussions continue with members of Council either in person, over the phone, or by email.





On the basis of available information, the comments of this office in regards to this application are as follows:

PROPOSED SUBDIVISION:

Andrew James Granger and **Colleen Gaye Granger** are the registered owners of the above noted quarter section (160 ac) which is located approximately four miles northeast of Nesbitt in the Municipality of Oakland Wawanesa. The majority of the property is used for agricultural purposes. There is a residence and yard site located in the northwest area of the quarter section.

The intent of this application is to sever the existing residence, yard site and some hay land from the quarter section. Although Community Planning normally would not approve such a large yard site, the extra land included in this subdivision has a Class 5 Soil Capability; therefore, Community Planning has no objection to the inclusion of the extra acres. The owners wish to create separate titles to the yard site and the residual land to allow for future options. The existing residence is serviced by an ejector and water is from an individual well. Access to the proposed parcel is from the municipal road to the west. No new driveways are proposed or required.

DEVELOPMENT PLAN:

The subject property is designated **Agricultural-General Area** according to the **R.M. of Oakland Development Plan**. Policy 4.1.5.b allows for subdivision where an existing farmstead site is no longer required as part of an agricultural operation or has become surplus.

The proposed subdivision may be considered under the applicable policies of the Development Plan.

ZONING BY-LAW:

The subject property is classified as "AG" Agricultural General Zoning District according to the R.M. of Oakland Zoning By-law. The "AG" Zone allows non-farm dwellings as a conditional use. The By-law requires the site area to be a minimum of 2 acres to a maximum of 10 acres and requires a minimum site width of 200 feet in the AG Zone.

A Variation Order will be required to increase the maximum site area from 10 acres to 20.21 acres.

COMMENTS:

The comments of other government departments and agencies are enclosed for the information of Council and the applicant.

Teranet (Land Titles):

Indicated that a one-lot plan of subdivision will be required.

MB Conservation & Climate (Environmental Ops):

Following conditional approval, the applicants must contact MB Conservation and Climate in regards
to the sewage ejector. The applicants may apply for a Certificate of Exemption in order to retain the

Agriculture:






