#2 REMINDER September 15, 2025 - On April 1, 2025, long awaited changes to *The Builders' Lien Act* were implemented in Manitoba which will impact how municipal construction projects are procured, contracted, managed, and financed. The changes add prompt payment and dispute adjudication systems for all construction projects covered by *The Builders' Lien Act* and contains a number of key changes aimed at ensuring the timely payment of contractors and subcontractors on construction projects. As frequent purchasers of construction services, municipalities need to be aware of how to comply with the recent changes as they plan and execute public works and other major construction projects in their communities.



Manitoba Government Launches 2025 Wildfire Disaster Financial Assistance Program to Support Impacted Communities

NOTE: This message is being sent on behalf of Manitoba Transportation and Infrastructure.

October 1, 2025 - The Manitoba government is launching the 2025 wildfire Disaster Financial Assistance (DFA) program to help municipalities recover from the devastating impacts of this year's unprecedented wildfire season, Transportation and Infrastructure Minister Lisa Naylor announced today.

"This has been the most severe wildfire season in Manitoba's history and our government is committed to supporting municipalities as they work to recover," said Naylor. "Lives have been lost, families displaced and communities deeply affected. Our government stands with Manitobans during this difficult time and is committed to helping municipalities rebuild and recover."

The DFA program will provide financial support for actions undertaken by municipalities and local authorities that have either been directly impacted or have incurred significant costs while hosting evacuees including:

- · pre-emptive preparation efforts,
- emergency response operations,
- recovery and restoration activities,
- · relief and recovery support, and
- · long-term wildfire mitigation strategies.

"We've witnessed incredible acts of compassion and resilience from communities across Manitoba," said Naylor. "From opening their doors to evacuees to mobilizing emergency resources, these communities have shown what it means to care for one another. This program is one way we're ensuring they're not alone in the recovery process."



October 7, 2025 - Manitoba is required by law to undertake a comprehensive review of recent amendments to The Planning Act and Part 6 of The City of Winnipeg Charter (formerly Bill 37 and Bill 34).

The review was carried out by consultant Braid Solutions Inc., who completed an independent review of the legislative amendments that included a comprehensive stakeholder engagement process.

What We Heard Report

The department is providing a further update on the statutory review by releasing the consultant's **What We Heard Report**. This report includes a summary of the feedback received during the review

process and includes the consultant's analysis. The What We Heard Report is attached to this bulletin for your reference.

What comes next?

The Minister of Municipal and Northern Relations is required to table a report on the review in the Legislative Assembly by October 29, 2025.

Manitobans Call for Federal Action on Local Priorities

In September 2025, the AMM and AMBM released the survey results in collaboration, calling on Ottawa to step up — by providing more funding to municipalities for building and upgrading critical water and wastewater infrastructure needed to support housing, and by implementing immediate bail reform and changes to the Criminal Code to hold repeat offenders accountable.

Infrastructure findings show that 83% of Manitobans believe the federal government needs to help municipalities fund essential water and wastewater projects such as treatment plants, sewer pipes, and sewage lagoons. Additionally, 70% of respondents emphasized that federal housing and infrastructure programs must be flexible enough to reflect the unique needs of different-sized communities.

On public safety, nearly **nine in ten** Manitobans **(88%)** believe the federal government must urgently reform the bail system to hold repeat offenders accountable, while **72%** want more federal funding for policing.

Together, the September survey results send a clear message that Manitobans want Ottawa to treat municipalities as true partners by investing in core infrastructure, improving public safety, and supporting the local priorities that drive growth and quality of life across the province.

Provincial Updates

The AMM Board of Directors discussed the recent announcement of the 2025/26 Manitoba Growth, Renewal and Opportunities (GRO) for Municipalities program. The AMM welcomes the provincial decision to open the Manitoba GRO program earlier than last year, a clear response to our advocacy and the feedback municipalities have provided on the importance of accelerating program timelines.

In September, the Province announced the official re-opening of MASC offices in Virden and Shoal Lake. Since the introduction of its rural service delivery model in 2021, the AMM raised concerns about limited broadband access and increased travel distances for many municipalities. Following several meetings with the department and senior officials, the AMM is pleased the Province responded to municipal feedback by reopening these offices to better serve communities.

Provincial Economic Development Strategy

The Manitoba government launched its new Economic Development Strategy, a positive first step the AMM has long called for. We are pleased the plan recognizes the importance of working with municipalities to improve water management and ensure water and wastewater services are available to support growth. However, we remain concerned that the strategy does not include specific investment commitments to achieve this goal. With more than 300 ready-to-go projects totaling over \$1.6 billion, we look forward to seeing how the Province will move from strategy to implementation.

The AMM also welcomes the plan's acknowledgment of the need to improve broadband and cellular connectivity across rural and northern Manitoba. While this recognition is encouraging, the strategy does not include any dedicated funding to address these gaps. Leveraging federal programs and future provincial investments will be essential to ensure all Manitobans have access to reliable and efficient broadband and cellular services.

MMSM Transition Plan to Full EPR

In August, the AMM participated in the Ministerial Advisory Committee alongside key stakeholders to review MMSM's revised Extended Producer Responsibility (EPR) transition plan. With the plan now posted on MMSM's website, the next step is public consultations. We strongly encourage all municipalities to review the plan and share their feedback — your input is vital to ensuring a smooth transition and strengthening waste management across Manitoba.

The upcoming AMM Fall Convention in Winnipeg will include dedicated breakout sessions on the transition plan, providing a valuable opportunity to learn more and raise any questions or concerns.

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Business and Community Newsletter September 2025

Features

Labour productivity, hourly compensation and unit labour cost, second quarter 2025

Labour productivity of Canadian businesses declined 1.0% in the second quarter. This decline followed a nearly flat variation in the first quarter, which had followed a strong increase of 1.2% in the fourth quarter of 2024. The last time productivity declined so sharply was in the fourth quarter of 2022 (-1.1%).

<u>Canadian Survey on Business Conditions, third quarter</u> **2025**

Businesses continue to anticipate a variety of obstacles over the next three months (see Note to readers). While pressures of both cost- and labour-related obstacles have continued into the third quarter of 2025, the proportion of businesses with a positive outlook has remained comparable with previous quarters.

Analysis on expected use of artificial intelligence by businesses in Canada, third quarter of 2025

This article explores how businesses plan to use AI over the next 12 months and the types of AI they intend to use when producing goods or delivering services. It also explores how businesses expect AI to affect their employment levels, what operational changes they anticipate over the next 12 months and why some are choosing not to use AI. It involves an examination of the data produced by the Canadian Survey on Business Conditions.

Gross domestic product, income and expenditure, second quarter 2025

Real gross domestic product (GDP) declined 0.4% in the second quarter of 2025, following a 0.5% gain in the first quarter. The contraction in the

second quarter was driven by significant declines in the export of goods, as well as decreased business investment in machinery and equipment. These declines were tempered by faster accumulations of business inventories, higher household spending and lower imports of goods.

Economic and Social Reports, August 2025

Renters' shelter costs can differ depending on how long they've lived in their current home. Renters who recently moved can pay substantially more than longstanding renters. The study "Renters' shelter costs by duration of tenancy," found that the gap between recent and long-term renters' shelter costs widened from 1996 to 2021.

Number of Canadian commuters increases for fourth straight year in 2025

For the fourth year in a row, the proportion of employed people mostly working from home was down in May 2025 (17.4%) compared with May 2024 (18.7%), resulting in more commuters on the roads.

Employment by industry in rural Canada: Interactive dashboard

The Employment by industry in rural Canada: Interactive dashboard includes new data and analysis for the July 2025 reference period. Data presented in this interactive dashboard are based on employment and unemployment rates from the <u>Labour Force Survey</u>.

Monthly Analysis on the Canadian Economic Tracker

The Canadian Economic Tracker presents selected monthly indicators from Statistics Canada's Common Output Database Repository to highlight the interrelated dynamics within the Canadian economy.

Canadian international merchandise trade, July 2025

In July, Canada's merchandise exports rose 0.9%, while imports were down 0.7%. As a result, Canada's merchandise trade deficit with the world narrowed from \$6.0 billion in June to \$4.9 billion in July.

Labour Force Survey, August 2025



Highlights

Employment declined by 66,000 (-0.3%) in August, largely the result of a decline in part-time work, and the employment rate fell 0.2 percentage points to 60.5%. The unemployment rate rose 0.2 percentage points to 7.1%.

Employment fell for core-aged (25 to 54 years old) men (-58,000; -0.8%) and core-aged women

(-35,000; -0.5%) in August. There was little change in employment for youth aged 15 to 24 and people aged 55 and older.

Employment decreased across several industries in August, led by professional, scientific and technical services (-26,000; -1.3%), transportation and warehousing (-23,000; -2.1%), and manufacturing (-19,000; -1.0%). On the other hand, there was an increase in construction employment (+17,000; +1.1%).

Every month, Statistics Canada conducts the Labour Force Survey to gather vital information about employment, unemployment, and labour market trends across the country. If you are selected, your voice matters because your response represents hundreds of Canadians. Your answers are confidential and combined with others so no one can be identified. Whether you are employed, looking for work, retired, or a student, your participation helps paint an accurate picture of Canada's economy. It helps inform decisions on job creation, education, pensions, and income support, and is used by governments, businesses, and researchers to improve the lives of Canadians. Completing the questionnaire is mandatory, but it's

also simple, secure, and a meaningful way to contribute to your community and country. Here are a few examples of how your participation in the Labour Force Survey contributes to vital insights that benefit us all.




Child care use by low-income families in Canada, 2023

It explores the difficulties finding a child care arrangement, the reasons for not using child care, as well as the types of child care used.

In 2023, **41% of children five and under** in low-income families attended a formal or informal type of child care, compared with **60% of children** in families not in low income.

About 6 in 10 children in child care attended a daycare centre, preschool or centre de la petite enfance (CPE), regardless of whether they were living in low income.








Just launched: Build Canada Homes

Yesterday, FCM's CEO Carole Saab participated to the federal government's announcement to launch Build Canada Homes (BCH). This announcement shows a clear commitment to working with municipalities and other essential partners to deliver practical, resultsdriven solutions that meet the urgent housing needs of Canadians.

FCM was glad to see inclusion of supportive and transitional housing for Canadians experiencing homelessness and emphasized the need for sustained federal-provincial funding to make lasting progress on homeless encampments. Through BCH, municipalities can contribute land, support modular construction, and continue leading on zoning, approvals, infrastructure, and community planning.



Reaching the federal goal of building 500,000 homes per year will require new investments in infrastructure needed to support housing, like roads, water systems and public transit through proven tools like the Canada Community Building Fund. FCM will continue to monitor and engage with the development of BCH and other housing and homelessness-related federal initiatives.



FCM welcomes the \$1.5B top up in loans under the Affordable Housing Fund's New Construction Stream and the decision to accelerate \$385 million in funding under the Affordable Housing Fund's Rapid Housing Sub-Stream. This will play an important role in ensuring housing projects that are already in the pipeline are not stalled while BCH is in development.

This announcement answers FCM's call to maintain momentum by quickly advancing urgently needed funding for affordable housing.










Advocacy update: postal service disruption and Canada Post strike

2025 Municipal Operating Grant Final Payment

I am pleased to inform you that the Department of Municipal and Northern Relations will be processing the final payment of the \$229.0 million Municipal Operating Grant, from the Strategic Municipal Investment Fund as part of Budget 2025.

For the 2025/26 fiscal year, the Municipality of Oakland-Wawanesa total operating grant is \$248,205.81. An initial payment of \$186,154.36, representing 75% of the operating grant was made in May 2025. The remaining 25%, totalling \$62,051.45, will be deposited into the municipality's account in the coming days.

The Municipal Operating Grant remains unconditional, which allows your municipality full flexibility to allocate the funding according to its local priorities. Similar to prior years, we are requesting that the municipality report on the notional or estimated allocation of Municipal Operating Grant funding towards core municipal services and programs, and to identify high level outcomes achieved in 2025. This report will support the department in gaining better understanding of how provincial funding is being applied locally to meet the ongoing and evolving municipal needs. Please complete and submit the 2025 report through Manitoba Municipalities Online by **June 30**, **2026**.

Important Notice to Elected Officials, Chief Administrative Officers and Municipal Finance Staff

Homeowners Affordability Tax Credit: Compensation for Administrative Costs

Manitoba has extended the time that homeowners can declare their principal residence and claim the Homeowners Affordability Tax Credit (HATC) in 2025 until November 15. Information about the extension was provided in Bulletin #2025-12 and 13.

For municipalities that provided the credit after issuing the tax notice, Manitoba is providing reimbursement of the HATC credited to homeowners' accounts or paid out to homeowners. Information about the reimbursement process and form was provided in Bulletin #2025-20.

Compensation for Administrative Costs

Commencing late September, to help offset the costs to administer the late credits or payments, Manitoba will make a payment to municipalities of \$25.00 per late HATC credited to homeowners' accounts or paid out to homeowners.

No application is necessary to receive the compensation. Manitoba Finance will calculate the amount using the data provided by municipalities in your HATC Reimbursement Request Forms. Payment memos will indicate HATC Administration Fee.

The Government of Manitoba appreciates municipalities' continuing work to ensure eligible taxpayers can participate in the HATC program. Without your partnership, this tax credit program would not be possible.

Important Notice to Chief Administrative Officers

CANADA POST SERVICE DISRUPTION

Due to the nationwide postal disruption, effective September 25, 2025, the delivery of printed assessment notices may be delayed. Property owners can find their 2026 assessment through one of the following alternate options:

- Visit Manitoba Assessment Online (MAO) to view 2026 assessments once they are posted; click the links below for your municipality's Notice dates and appeal deadlines:
 - <u>Manitoba Assessment Online Property Search</u> no password or User ID is required to view land, building, and total assessments.
 - Notice dates per municipality
 - Appeal deadline dates per municipality
- Create a MyPropertyMB account to view their assessment and property details online, via MyPropertyMB
- Call or email their District Assessment Office: <u>Property Assessment Services District offices</u>. Property owners may also contact their district Property Assessment Services office to arrange for emailing of an electronic notice or pick-up of a printed assessment notice during the postal disruption.
- Municipalities post public notice annually when assessment rolls are available for public viewing, including the deadline for filing appeals and the date of their board of revision.
 Property owners may call or email their municipal office to inquire if and when the 2026 Assessment Roll is available for public viewing, and for appeal deadlines.
- Municipalities will be provided with 2026 assessment notices according to the notice schedule provided in the link above. If requested by a resident, municipalities may choose to print notices for property owners to pick up at their local municipal office.
- Please note that the mailing of assessment notices will commence once regular mail service resumes, however, the notices will continue to reference appeal deadlines that may have passed.

Sending Supplementary Tax Notices to taxpayers by municipalities

Section 327(1) of The Municipal Act advises that "If supplementary taxes are imposed, the municipality must send a supplementary tax notice to the taxpayer." The common interpretation is that the tax notice should be sent in the same manner as regular tax statements, i.e. in the mail.

In response to the current Canada Post strike, we would suggest that municipal offices could choose to send the supplementary tax notices by courier, by hand delivery, or with the property owner by facilitating in-person pick-up or drop-off. We would not encourage sending tax notices by email, as *The Municipal Act* does not establish electronic notification as a primary delivery method. If municipalities have property owner email addresses in their system, emailing tax notices may be a reasonable option during a postal disruption as an additional method of delivery to provide convenience to the owner.

Sending or Receiving Mail to or from Manitoba government

Municipalities will be able to continue to send and receive essential mail to and from Manitoba government. Manitoba's Material Distribution Agency (MDA) will be operating 24 mail distribution and drop-off centres throughout Manitoba for critical government mail.

Information for municipalities and the public about these distribution centres, including contact information and which community is served by which distribution centre, is included as an attachment to this bulletin. Please note that these distribution centres will **only process critical mail going to, or coming from, the provincial government.**

Municipalities should **not** bring non-essential mail to a distribution centre, as non-essential mail brought to these centres will be held, and then sent through Canada Post once the postal disruption is over.

Receiving Critical Mail

Critical mail that will continue to be sent from Manitoba through these distribution centres include cheques (for municipalities and the public) and Court or other legal/regulatory Orders. Other items deemed to be critical by Manitoba will also be sent through these centres.

Municipal staff collecting mail from a distribution centre should be prepared to **provide photo ID** and should have an authorization letter on municipal letterhead.

Sending Critical Mail

For municipalities sending mail to Manitoba, only critical mail should be brought to a distribution centre. If you are sending critical mail to Manitoba, **the mail must be clearly marked as critical.** Critical mail to Manitoba would be cheques or other payments, or reports or documents required by legislation or as part of a legislated process. For example:

- Regulatory submissions (to the Municipal Finance Officer, Municipal Board, Public Utilities Board, etc.)
- Other legislated submissions to Manitoba e.g. notices of proposed road closings, planning notices and bylaws, etc.

Canada Post Mail Disruption Guidelines

As of September 26, 2025, the Canadian Union of Postal Workers (CUPW) have walked off the job in response to the federal government's proposed changes to Canada Post Corporation (CPC). This has resulted in a general postal labour disruption. The following definitions and distribution plan will now apply:

ESSENTIAL MAIL: cheques, court orders, educational material, or other items required to conduct essential business. It also includes medical supplies such as blood, tissue, water samples, x-rays necessary to maintain health care, and anything your department's executive deem essential.

NON-ESSENTIAL MAIL: Letter Mail, Oversize Letter Mail, parcels and all other items not deemed essential mail.

INTERDEPARTMENTAL MAIL (IDM): mail currently distributed between Interdepartmental Mail (IDM) locations.

Materials Distribution Agency (MDA) will be sending mail to 24 distribution points throughout Manitoba, including one Winnipeg location at 401 York. These points will serve as "pick up" centres for the local geographic area.

Two kinds of mail will be distributed to and from these centres:

- 1.) Essential Mail mail for the general public
- 2.) Interdepartmental Mail (IDM) mail for government offices that are part of the current internal mail system.

The general public will be able to phone a 1-800 number to enquire where they may pick up their essential mail. This number will be published in newspapers throughout the province. Radio advertising will direct the general public to the newspaper advertising.

A list, cross-referencing essential mail distribution centres with towns in those geographic areas, has been included in this information package to assist government personnel in determining where essential mail should be sent.

The PUB Post – Fall Newsletter, October 2025

The vision of the PUB is to be a trusted, respected regulator that sets rates for utilities by balancing the interests of ratepayers with the financial health of the utility. In doing so, it examines the long-term, reliable utility services for Manitobans. It does this through efficient, transparent <u>regulatory processes</u> where it makes decisions based on evidence before it and then communicates its decisions publicly in a timely manner.

Here are some of the PUB's 2025/26 calendar highlights that may interest readers:

Centra Gas Update

On October 7, 2024, Centra Gas Manitoba Inc. (Centra) filed its 2025 General Rate Application, asking the PUB to finalize the interim approval of a 4.5% general revenue increase that had been in effect since November 1, 2024. Centra also requested approval of adjustments to rates that include transportation of natural gas to Manitoba for distribution to customers and the costs to store natural gas during the summer months for use in the winter.

The PUB and approved Interveners requested additional information from Centra to assist the parties in understanding the application and its impact to consumers, and the Interveners were also asked for additional information on the evidence they submitted. The public hearing, which included <u>public presentations</u> by Environmental Defence Canada and Manitoba Eco-Network, began on June 12, 2025, and took place over 10 days.

On September 16, 2025, the <u>PUB issued its Order</u>, finalizing the 4.5% interim general revenue increase in place since November 1, 2024, and approving additional increases of 4.5% effective November 1, 2025, and 4.0% effective November 1, 2026. While Centra applied for only one year, the Board concluded that additional increases were required to help Centra achieve positive net income and mitigate further losses as Centra had not filed a new rate application for six years. The approved increases apply only to the distribution costs, and not the price of natural gas. The three-year rate increase will result in a gradual increase that should lead to positive net income for Centra over the period 2024/25 to 2026/27.

Despite the increases approved in this order, natural gas bills for an average residential customer remain lower than they were 15 years ago. The increases are also less than cumulative inflation since the 2019/20 General Rate Application. PUB expects the bill impacts to customers to be less than the stated percentages. Natural gas remains the most cost-effective heating option in Manitoba.

MPI Update

On June 25, 2025, Manitoba Public Insurance (MPI) filed its <u>2026 General Rate Application</u> (GRA), which asked the PUB to approve a 2.07% rate increase for the Basic Autopac vehicle insurance rates and premiums, effective April 1, 2026 through March 31, 2027. The rate application does not apply to the rates in the non-compulsory (Extension) line of business. Examples of Extension insurance products include lower deductibles, increased third party liability coverage, and rental vehicle insurance. Rate decisions for Extension insurance are made by the MPI Board of Directors, and do not require the approval of the PUB.

One important issue to be addressed this year is the impact of the former Project Nova which has been terminated and merged into the IT plan

The PUB published a notice in the Winnipeg Free Press informing the public of the

application and advising of important steps and deadlines that occur prior to the public hearing. Interested parties who wanted to seek Intervener status at the hearing notified the PUB by July 3rd and Manitobans interested in submitting a brief or expressing comments at the hearing were directed to contact the PUB through its <u>online comment tool</u>.

To prepare for the upcoming hearing, the PUB and approved Interveners requested additional information from MPI to assist the parties in understanding the application and its impact on consumers. This additional information is available on the PUB's website www.pubmanitoba.ca and is also filed as exhibits (evidence) at the hearing.

The public hearing for the 2026 General Rate Application starts on Tuesday, October 14 at 9:00 a.m. and it will be <u>livestreamed on the PUB's website</u>.

Manitoba Hydro Update

On March 28, 2025, Manitoba Hydro (Hydro) filed its <u>2026 to 2028 General Rate Application</u> (GRA), asking the PUB to approve an overall increase of 3.5% each year, which would come into effect on January 1, 2026, January 1, 2027, and January 1, 2028. Hydro based the request on the revenue it forecasts to run the electric system, perform maintenance, and to rebuild and expand the system as needed to continue to provide reliable, safe, and effective service to customers. In its GRA Manitoba Hydro stated the following as some of the reasons for the three-year rate request:

- Drought conditions and low water which results in lower income and higher debt.
- Significant concurrent assets over the next two decades to address aging assets and reliability.
- Increases in operating expenses, primarily as a result of negotiated wage settlements, staffing resources and expenditures required for reliable operation and maintenance of the electric system.
- Maintaining the debt -to-capitalization ratio over the next 10 years.
- Funding Business Operations Capital with cash from operations in most years rather than increasing debt.
- Maintain debt ratio over the 10-year period 2025/26 to 2034/35 when the majority of capital investments are needed.

Manitoba Hydro also stated the elimination of capital taxes and staged reduction of the provincial debt guarantee reduction announced in the 2025/26 provincial budget reduced the rate request to 3.5% rather than the required 5.5% in each year to achieve the same financial results. Finally, Manitoba Hydro stated that even with the 3.5% proposed rate

increases, its rates will continue to be the lowest in Canada, or among the lowest in the next three years compared to other similar Canadian utilities.

The positions of Manitoba Hydro on the above issues will be fully tested at the GRA hearing later this year.

Based on the application Hydro filed, it is estimated that a residential customer without electric heat (using an average of 1,000 kilowatt-hours (kWh) per month), the average impact of the proposed increase would be approximately \$3.70 per month after January 1, 2026, an additional \$3.80 per month after January 1, 2027, and an additional \$3.95 per month after January 1, 2028.

For a residential customer with electric heat (using an average of 2,000 kilowatt-hours (kWh) per month), the average impact of the proposed increase would be approximately \$7.05 per month after January 1, 2026, an additional \$7.30 per month after January 1, 2027, and an additional \$7.55 per month after January 1, 2028.

The public hearing for the Hydro 2026 to 2028 General Rate Application starts on November 17, 2025, and although the deadline to apply to become an approved intervener in the hearing has passed, Manitobans are able to share their views on the proposed rate increases with the Public Utilities Board in two ways:

- As a Presenter If you want to make a virtual or in-person formal presentation and are willing to respond to questions about your presentation, <u>you can apply to</u> <u>become an approved Presenter</u>. Presentations are limited to a maximum of 10 minutes; or
- · By submitting written comments on the rate increase.

Continuing Education

The PUB employs a continuous improvement philosophy and an innovation mindset to enhance its decision-making and its responsiveness to stakeholders. Members stay up to date on current regulatory issues and best practices in other jurisdictions by holding ongoing educational sessions, reviewing articles and discussions from other jurisdictions on best practices, and by

maintaining memberships and actively participating in regulatory associations such as the Canadian Automobile Insurance Rate Regulators (CARR) and CAMPUT, which is the organization for Canada's energy and utility regulators.

These regulatory associations are recognized and respected nationally as providers of education and best practice resources in automobile insurance, energy, and utility regulation. Each association is focused on helping members stay informed on the most recent industry trends, policy development, and provide opportunities for regulatory improvement.

CAMPUT traces its roots back to the early 1960s and was formally established in 1976 as the "Canadian Association of Members of Public Utility Tribunals". Its objective was "to promote the quality of public utility regulation in Canada by providing the forum for the exchange of information and views among the members of the Association." Over time, the association recognized the demand for further education and training in utility regulation was growing, and in 1986 responded by developing a training and educational program which is delivered through an annual educational conference. The program became so popular that it transformed into a public conference in 1990.

In 2003, membership became available to public utility tribunals (also called commissions) in countries other than Canada, and in 2007 associate membership became available to other Canadian regulatory tribunals or commissions. In 2011, the CAMPUT Constitution was amended to drop the name "Canadian Association of Members of Public Utility Tribunals", but to continue using the acronym, because it was widely recognized throughout the regulatory industry.

CAMPUT hosts three major educational sessions each year:

- The spring CAMPUT Conference, with 500+ attendees from Canadian and non-Canadian regulators, government, non-government organizations, the academic community, and other stakeholders.
- The fall Annual General Meeting, attended by 50+ Canadian regulators.
- The winter Regulatory Key Topics Meeting, a virtual educational meeting is offered to Canadian regulators and staff.

These educational sessions bring together regional, national and international participants, with first-rate education programs, and assist CAMPUT members in maintaining ongoing relationships with major regulatory organizations such as <u>NARUC</u>, <u>NERC</u>, and <u>ICER</u>.

For those who are new to the energy regulation field, each year CAMPUT holds a weeklong, intensive Energy Regulation Course and, as a way to further promote excellence in regulation across Canada, CAMPUT established "Communities of Interest" which focusses on areas of specific interest to its members. These communities gather to share information and learn from each other outside of the formal education offerings.

In September 2025, the PUB hosted the 2025 CAMPUT AGM which brought together regulators from across the country to discuss current issues facing the energy sector and best practices to help navigate a constantly evolving landscape. The educational sessions featured opportunities for board chairs and commissioners (known as board members in Manitoba) to present information and engage in discussions about the challenges they face in their respective jurisdictions. While many jurisdictions face the same challenges, the roles and powers of the regulators vary across the country, providing an opportunity to share unique perspectives.
