The Accessibility Advisory Council is Launching the Second Review of the Accessible Customer Service Regulation

10-Year Review of the Accessible Customer Service Standard Regulation

The Accessibility Advisory Council (council) is launching its ten-year review of Manitoba's Accessible



Customer Service Standard Regulation. The standard, created in 2015, sets requirements for organizations to provide accessible customer service for people with disabilities.

The review will examine what is working well, what challenges remain and what changes may be needed to improve this law across Manitoba.

The council's [first review of this standard was completed in 2021](#) and resulted in 22 recommendations to strengthen awareness, implementation, accountability, resources and accessibility outcomes. Since then, the Manitoba government has [reported progress](#) in several areas, including accessibility planning, training and guidance resources, compliance reporting and engagement.

The council is seeking feedback from people with disabilities, businesses, municipalities, public sector organizations, community groups, employees and other interested Manitobans. Opportunities to participate may include a survey, written submissions, targeted meetings and an online engagement session. Details are still being finalized.

Spotlight on an Accessibility Project in our Community



Featured Project: West-End Day Care Centre

West-End Day Care Centre is a non-profit, licensed childcare facility for children between the ages of 18 months and 12 years old located in Portage la Prairie, Manitoba. Our centre strives to provide high quality inclusive early learning and childcare with a focus on developmentally appropriate programming. We look to each child to determine how to best meet their learning and development needs. We want all children to have the opportunity to participate and contribute to their daily play and interactions with their peers and staff. Our centre is fortunate to have the support of the Speech and Language Pathologists and the Occupational Therapist from the Portage la Prairie General Hospital District. They have helped the staff implement the use of augmentative and alternative communication devices with the children in our program.

With support from the Manitoba Accessibility Fund, West-End Day Care obtained two augmentative and alternative communication devices to assist the increasing number of children who are non-verbal. Purchasing the two iPads and installing communication apps was our goal. This allowed the staff to model language throughout the day and the children could learn to use the picture symbols to communicate their wants and needs to others in their environment. By creating a system of support, children could be included, heard and accepted for who they are as individuals. We

immediately noticed less frustration among the children when their peers and early childhood educators understood what they wanted or needed.

West-End Day Care Centre continues to move forward in enhancing accessibility by making sensory adjustments in our program through soft lighting, calming corners and adding resources to keep background noises to a minimum.

Compliance Corner

Service Animals: Did you know?

Did you know Manitoba's [Accessible Customer Service Standard Regulation](#) requires organizations in the province to allow service animals to accompany their handler in any space that is open to the public?

This means service animals must be allowed to accompany their handler when shopping at a store, eating at a restaurant, staying at a hotel, attending a medical appointment, taking a cab or renting an apartment. Some restrictions apply in settings such as operating rooms or the kitchen of a food service establishment.

Did you know that there is no standardized certification, training program or registry for service animals in Manitoba?

This means any animal that has been trained, including self-trained, to provide disability-related tasks for a person with a disability may be considered a service animal under [The Accessibility for Manitobans Act](#) and [The Manitoba Human Rights Code](#).

Did you know as an organization offering goods or customer service, staff can ask: “Has this animal been trained to help with a disability-related need?”

Some handlers carry documentation, such as a letter, note or form from a regulated health professional that states that they require the animal because of a disability-related need. An organization may consider asking for documentation only when the service the animal is providing is not obvious. Organizations must not require documentation in customer service scenarios that are brief or irregular.

Additionally, no one should ask for or require the handler to identify their diagnosis or demonstrate the animal's ability to perform the task for which it is trained.

Service animals must always be under the control of their handler. If the animal is barking excessively, misbehaving or demonstrating aggressive behaviour, an organization may ask the handler to remove the animal from the premise.

During that time, he applied to the United Nations refugee program and was accepted for potential resettlement in the United States, Canada or Australia.

Yousif arrived in Canada from Egypt as a landed immigrant and settled in Winnipeg, where he has made his home. He began by enrolling in an ESL program in the city. After completing it, he applied to adult education programs, but faced barriers related to his blindness.

Each month, Ripples of Goodness celebrates the people, ideas, and community initiatives creating connection across our province.

This month, we travel to Richer, where a simple lunch is doing something extraordinary: building connection, one shared meal at a time.

Heartfelt Community Lunches: Making Life Richer Together

Heartfelt Community Lunches have become one of the most meaningful ways for rural Manitoba towns to strengthen connection, reduce isolation, and celebrate the people who make local life vibrant. In places like Richer, where neighbours often support one another through informal networks, a shared meal becomes more than food on a plate, it becomes a gathering place for stories, kindness, and belonging.

These lunches fall under the **RM of Ste. Anne's Age-Friendly initiative**. They helped shape the RM's successful application for Age-Friendly status, inspired in part by the long-running senior lunches at Centre de l'amitié in La Broquerie and Club Jovial in Ste. Anne. Those monthly gatherings have been building community for years, and their success encouraged the RM to expand this model. Heartfelt Lunches launched in January 2025 and have quickly become a welcoming hub for residents from Richer and neighbouring communities.

A Heartfelt lunch works because it is simple, familiar, and warm. Homemade soups, bannock, garden vegetables, or a pot of chili create an atmosphere that feels like home. The lunch is intentionally low-cost and accessible, offered by donation, with a suggested \$5 contribution. Every dollar goes directly back into the Heartfelt Lunch fund, keeping the program sustainable and community-led.

People arrive not as clients, but as neighbours: seniors, newcomers, families, and volunteers sharing memories, laughter, and updates about community life. When rides are offered through Handi-Van services, volunteer drivers, or “bring-a-neighbour” invitations, the lunch becomes truly accessible. It reflects Age-Friendly values of fairness, inclusion, and respect. Most importantly, it reminds everyone that community is built through small, consistent acts of care. A warm meal, a friendly table, and a place to belong can make life in Richer feel richer for all.

Promoting Transparency in Municipal Elections: Candidate Registration, Nomination and Public Disclosure FAQ

NOTE: This message is being sent on behalf of Municipal and Northern Relations

August 31, 2026 - To help ensure transparency, consistency, and public trust, this FAQ explains the difference between campaign finance registration and nomination, outlines when a person officially becomes a candidate, and clarifies when candidate information is made public. It is designed to help residents, prospective candidates, and other interested parties better understand the municipal election process.

This FAQ was developed in consultation with the Manitoba Department of Municipal and Northern Relations and the Manitoba Municipal Administrators (MMA) to help ensure that the information provided is accurate, consistent, and aligned with applicable legislation and election requirements.

REMINDER - September 1, 2026 - Manitoba recently became the first Canadian Province to mandate free menstrual products in provincially regulated workplaces. **Effective today, September 1, 2026**, amendments to the Workplace Safety and Health Regulation require employers to provide both tampons and menstrual pads at no cost, as well as covered disposal containers, in all employee washrooms.

Application Form & Guidelines for Attachments to Manitoba Hydro Infrastructure - Important Notice of Deadline for Removal of Non-compliant Installations

NOTE: This message is being sent on behalf of Manitoba Hydro

September 8, 2026 - Manitoba Hydro is committed to *Energy for Life* and supporting municipalities, towns and cities across the province. Further to the advisory note you may have received in June 2025, we are pleased to share important updates and guidance now available on hydro.mb.ca regarding the safe installation of accessory attachments on Manitoba Hydro infrastructure.

Communities and organizations that currently have non-compliant banner holders, banners or planters installed will have until **December 31, 2026** to update or remove them. We will begin removing non-compliant installations, workload permitting, starting **January 2027**.

Public safety and the safety of our infrastructure is our top priority. Accessory attachments such as flowerpots, banners, banner holders and holiday lighting on utility infrastructure can create additional wind loading that can exceed design limits. This kind of added stress may lead to premature infrastructure wear and potential failures, posing risks to public safety and service reliability.

Please review the up-to-date guidance and specifications for all installations, along with application information, on our website at this link: hydro.mb.ca/service/permits/utility-pole-decoration/. This webpage outlines the application process and details the requirements in place to protect Manitoba Hydro infrastructure and the communities we serve.

We thank you for your cooperation and your commitment to keeping our communities safe. Together, we can ensure that Manitoba Hydro's infrastructure remains strong and dependable for years to come.

I wanted to make sure that you were aware of the [Brandon Area Community Foundation \(BACF\) Community Grants Program](#), which provides funding for projects that strengthen communities throughout the Brandon and Westman region. Please be sure to review their website to learn more about the program and be sure to share this information with your network.

****Grant applications for 2026 must be submitted by 4:00 PM on Wednesday, September 23.**

Criteria

BACF encourages organizations to submit innovative, well planned and managed projects.

Each grant application will be required to meet the following criteria:

- Must have other funding Partners financially committed to the project. (BACF cannot be the only financial source of funding.)
- Must provide two (2) contractor/supplier quotes if applicable;
- Build on the strengths of the community to respond to identified issues and priorities;
- Demonstrate responsible financial and legal accountability;
- Organizations must be well governed and managed;
- Be timely;
- Be realistic and within the capacity of the organization to carry out;
- Not duplicate existing services or, if so, demonstrate that the overlap is warranted;
- Demonstrate inclusiveness and respect for cultural diversity;
- Provide evidence of collaboration/funding sources with other community agencies;
- Demonstrate a reasonable probability of ongoing support from other funding sources in the future, or clearly indicate that the project is intended to continue for only a limited time span.

Organizations considering an application are encouraged to review the [program guidelines](#) carefully to ensure their project aligns with eligibility requirements and funding priorities.

If there are any other initiatives you are working towards and would appreciate updates or information on other funding programs, please be sure to let me know so that I can forward the appropriate information to you.

RMED respects the treaties that were made on these lands where we will work together. We commit to reconciliation along the path to economic prosperity.

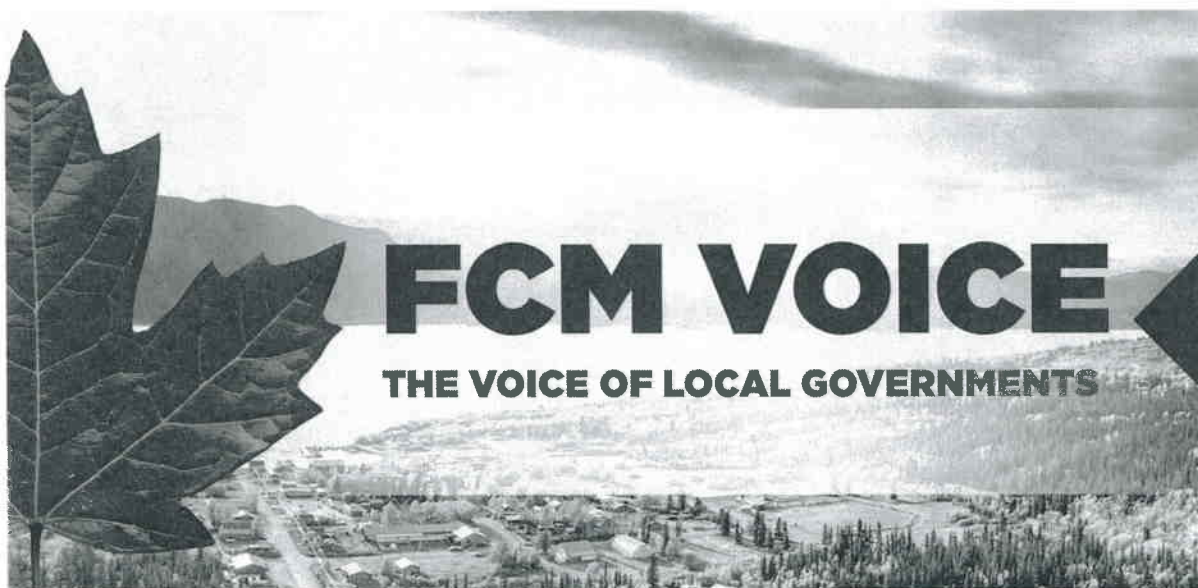

Last week, FCM President Tim Tierney attended the federal government's release of Canada's Responsible Data Centre Development Principles. These principles are designed to guide the responsible development of AI data centres in Canadian communities, emphasizing early engagement with local governments, municipal approval and transparency on community impacts over projects' lifecycles.

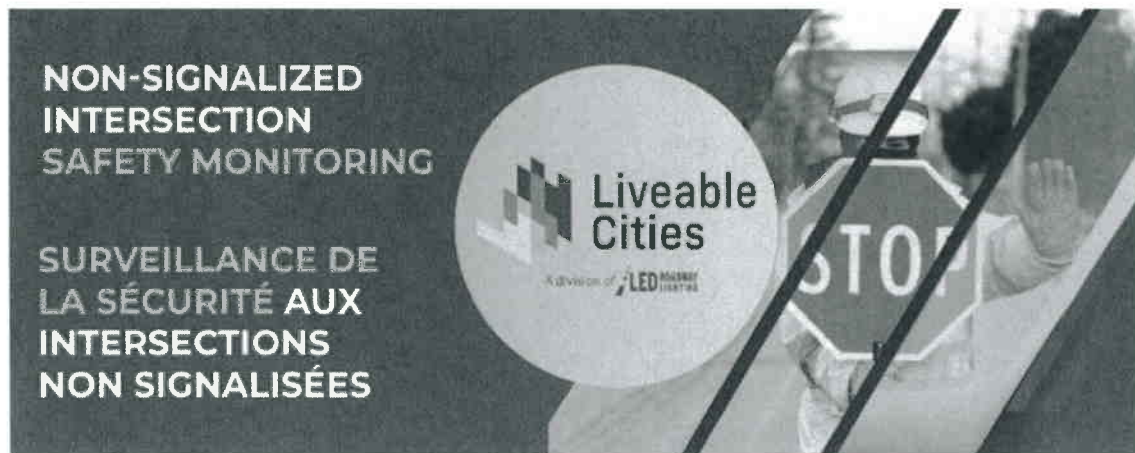

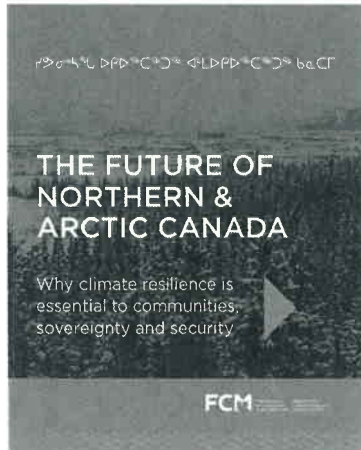

MWF raises concerns over possible Interlake wildlife land transfers

The Manitoba Wildlife Federation is raising concerns over the potential transfer of Interlake wildlife management area lands to Peguis First Nation through the Treaty Land Entitlement process.

The Manitoba Wildlife Federation says it is seeking answers from the provincial government after learning that numerous parcels within several Interlake Wildlife Management Areas are being considered for transfer to Peguis First Nation through the Treaty Land Entitlement process.

MWF senior policy advisor Chris Heald said the organization was alerted to the potential transfers after a municipality copied the federation on correspondence to Manitoba Environment and Climate Change Minister Ian Bushie.

“We fully support the treaty land entitlement process,” Heald said. “But it was always for Crown lands, not for Wildlife Management Areas or Provincial Parks.”

Heald said the federation became concerned after seeing the number of parcels involved and their locations, which he said are in several WMAs and, in some cases, a considerable distance from Peguis First Nation.

The federation has since contacted the provincial minister’s office and is preparing to meet with government officials

Heald said the government is still determining how far the claims have progressed and that MWF does not yet have complete information about the exact parcels under consideration.

“We’re trying to see where it is in the process, how long, how far along it is,” he said.

The potential transfers have raised concerns because of the role the WMAs play in protecting wildlife habitat while providing public access for hunting, fishing and other outdoor activities.

Heald said many of the areas were purchased or otherwise acquired by the province in the 1960s and 1970s specifically to support wildlife populations.

“These lands were purchased with taxpayers’ dollars,” he said. “A lot of them were purchased from landowners with the idea that these lands would be held, you know, for all time to benefit wildlife.”

The areas provide habitat for species including elk, moose and white-tailed deer and are used by hunters and other outdoor enthusiasts, including First Nations and Métis people.

One of MWF’s primary concerns is that a transfer to reserve land could change who has access to the properties.

“If this were to go through, then a single First Nation would control access,” Heald said.

He said that could mean licensed hunters, anglers, Métis people and members of other First Nations could potentially lose access to lands that are currently available for public recreational use.

The federation also questions why WMA lands farther from Peguis First Nation would be selected when Crown land closer to the First Nation is available.

“What’s the reasoning for that?” Heald said. “We’re hoping to get a bit more information and just some clarification on the decision process here.”

Under the TLE Framework Agreement, MWF says wildlife management areas and provincial parks are generally excluded from selection, except in circumstances considered extraordinary or extreme.

Heald said the federation has not yet been given an explanation for why the WMA parcels would qualify under those provisions.

“Unless there’s extenuating circumstances that we’re unaware of, we want to make sure that these lands remain open to all Manitobans,” he said.

Heald also said the issue extends beyond the specific parcels currently being considered because of the precedent a transfer could establish.

“If these lands can be transferred, then what does that mean for other Wildlife Management Areas?” he said.

MWF argues that the province's WMAs represent a conservation success story because they allow wildlife habitat to be protected while remaining accessible to the public.

Heald said the federation would rather see additional investment in managing the areas through measures such as prescribed burning, fencing and other habitat-management work.

"The Wildlife Management Areas is a massive success," he said. "All Manitobans get to share in them."

Heald said the province appears to have been caught off guard by the potential transfers as well, describing the claims as something that had been moving through what was likely a routine process without attracting widespread attention.

The federal government is also involved in treaty land entitlement claims, adding another level of government to the process.

MWF is now waiting for further details from the province before determining its next steps.

"We look forward to hearing the rationale for why they're selected," Heald said.

The federation said it will continue advocating for WMAs to remain protected for conservation purposes and accessible to Manitobans while supporting the broader resolution of outstanding Treaty Land Entitlement claims.

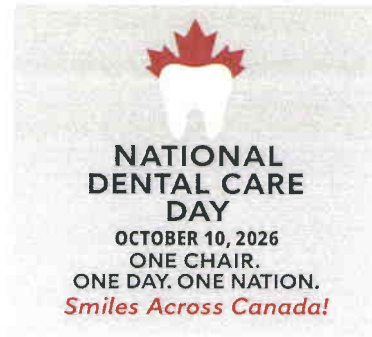

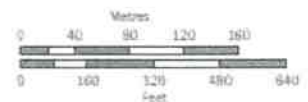

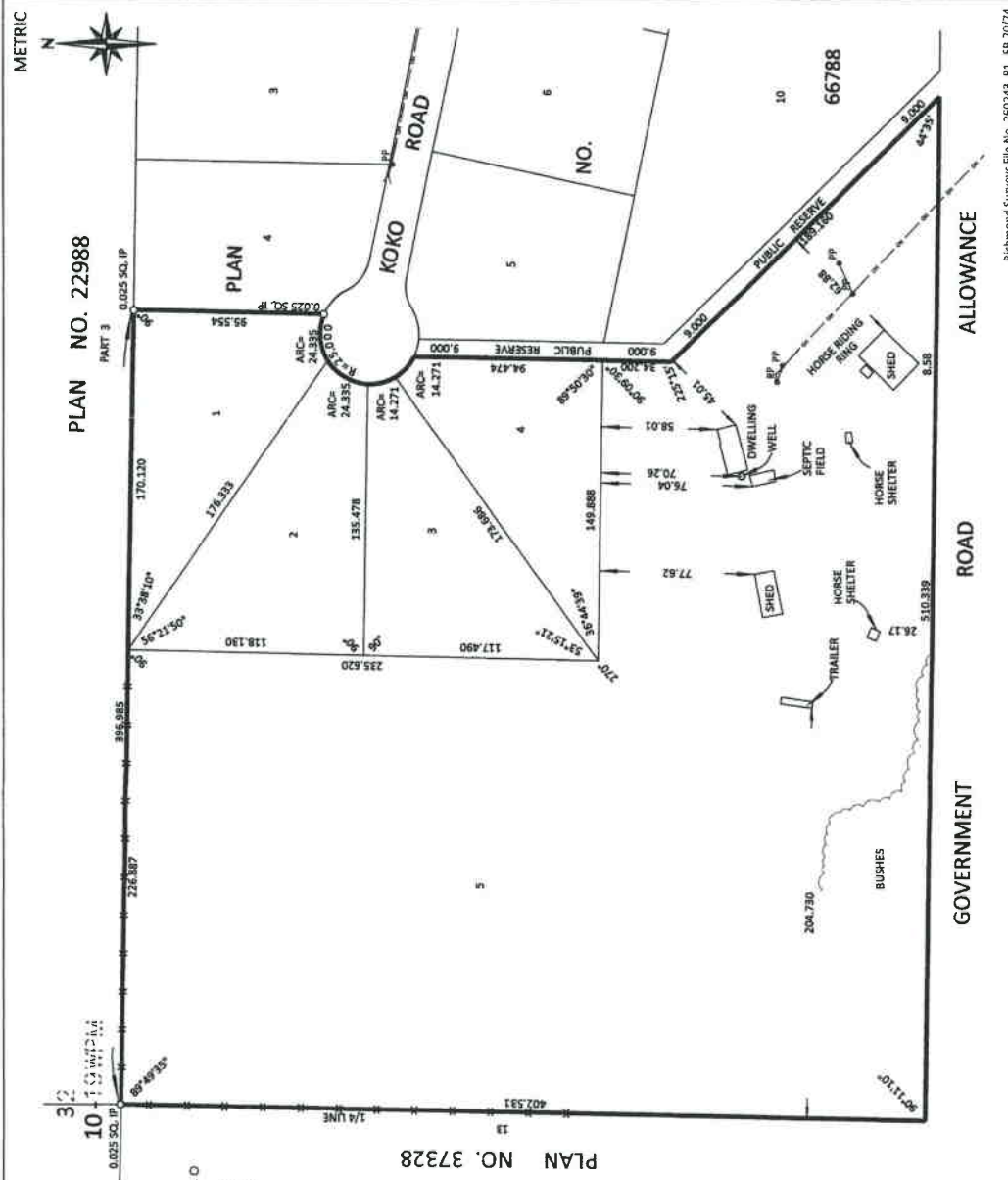
