



Manitoba Accessibility Fund

We're thrilled to announce that the 2026/27 intake period for the Manitoba Accessibility Fund will officially open and the intake will run for six weeks from January 12 to February 20, 2026.

Grant applicants may request up to a maximum of \$50,000 from the Manitoba Accessibility Fund to complete proposed projects. All eligible organizations are invited to submit a project application.

To qualify, organizations must have been in operation for one year before application and may include:

- registered charities
- non-profit organizations incorporated and registered with the Companies Office
- non-profit organizations that have a bank account and can verify activity for at least one year
- local businesses or corporations based in Manitoba providing services to Manitobans that are registered with the Companies Office
- on-reserve businesses and organizations that meet all other eligibility requirements
- municipalities and local authorities such as planning districts and Northern Affairs Community Councils
- universities, colleges and school divisions

Organizations are limited to submitting one application per intake but may be listed as partners on the applications of other project submissions.

All Manitoba Accessibility Fund applicants must fulfill at least one of the following objectives in support of The Accessibility for Manitobans Act:

- raise awareness about removing barriers encountered by persons with disabilities, such as the development of accessibility guides that are tailored to the specific circumstances of members
- develop tools, resources and training to support compliance with regulated accessibility standards under The Accessibility for Manitobans Act
- remove barriers to information and communication electronically, in print and in person. This can include the establishment of a centralized pool of funds to facilitate ASL interpretation or to make websites accessible

Get Ready to Apply

Now is the perfect time to start planning. Here's how you can get ahead:

- review past projects funded by the Manitoba Accessibility Fund for inspiration

Spotlight on a Manitoba Accessibility Fund Project

Featured Project: The Higher Learning Foundation

This month, the Manitoba Accessibility Fund is proud to spotlight the Higher Learning Foundation and their accessibility project.

The Higher Learning Foundation (HLF) is a registered charity that focuses on various types of mental fitness programming. We have three pillars of programming, including our Fundamentals of Mental Fitness courses and workshops (Educate), scholarship offerings (Engage) and public art programming and community wellness events (Empower).

Our Manitoba Accessibility Fund project gave us the opportunity to create an ASL-Friendly Digital Video series of our 110 Hour Fundamentals of Mental Fitness Program. The goal of the project was to create a digital version that could be used at organizations and high schools that facilitate programming to the Deaf community. We recorded the video series and partnered with ECCOE to add the ASL-translation to the videos. The funding enabled us to create a tool that can be offered at high schools and frontline charities serving vulnerable populations. We are also actively working to bring the workshop materials to corporate teams, who will have access to videos that can be shared with Deaf employees.

We are actively building partnerships with major Winnipeg organizations that serve Deaf Manitobans. Our programming, including the video series we created with this funding, is available in rural Manitoba communities including Richer and Portage la Prairie. Our goal for 2026 is to facilitate Mental Fitness wellness retreats, which will include the use of the video series we created with the funding from the Manitoba Accessibility Fund.

Manitoba Government Introduces Legislation to Recognize Sign Language

The Manitoba government marked the International Day of Persons with Disabilities by introducing legislation that highlighted the linguistic and cultural uniqueness of sign languages used by Deaf, Hard-of-Hearing and Deaf-Blind Manitobans, Families Minister Nahanni Fontaine, minister responsible for accessibility, announced on December 3, 2025.

“For years, Deaf, Hard-of-Hearing and Deaf-Blind Manitobans have been clear that sign languages are central to their identity and culture,” said Fontaine. “The Sign Language Recognition Act is the result of more than a year of working alongside Deaf, Hard-of-Hearing and Deaf-Blind Manitobans. This bill will recognize and promote the use of sign languages throughout Manitoba and support inclusion, access and community identity.”


The proposed legislation would recognize American Sign Language, Quebec sign language, Indigenous sign languages and tactile sign languages as distinct languages with their own grammar, structure and cultural heritage. Manitoba is the first province in Canada to introduce standalone sign language recognition legislation.

While some jurisdictions recognize sign languages through accessibility legislation or policy, the minister noted that sign languages are the first and primary language for many Deaf, Hard-of-Hearing and Deaf-Blind Manitobans, not an accessibility tool.

The Manitoba government is also consulting with Manitobans on a proposed regulation that would establish the framework for enforcing accessibility requirements under The Accessibility for Manitobans Act including the ability to issue orders and administrative penalties for deliberate non-compliance.

The International Day of Persons with Disabilities, observed annually on Dec. 3, promotes understanding of disability issues and highlights efforts to protect the dignity, rights and well-being of people with disabilities.

Compliance Corner

Announcement: Public feedback on proposed Accessibility Penalties Regulation is Now OPEN

Manitoba's [Accessibility Compliance Secretariat](#) is an office of the Manitoba government with the authority to promote, monitor and enforce compliance with requirements under [The Accessibility for Manitobans Act](#) and its regulated standards.

A proposed new regulation related to penalties for noncompliance has been posted on the provincial government's proposed regulation [website](#) for public feedback.

Manitobans and organizations are encouraged to submit their input on the proposed regulation, which includes information about orders and monetary penalties that will be issued to entities demonstrating wilful noncompliance with accessibility legislation.

Feedback is also being sought on whether information about organizations that receive penalties should be published.

Manitobans will have until noon on February 2, 2026, to provide feedback.

What is an Administrative Penalty?

An administrative penalty is a financial consequence of not following legislative or regulatory requirements. Administrative penalties are issued by designated government officials who oversee compliance with applicable legislation.

An accessibility compliance framework guides the work of the accessibility compliance secretariat, and the framework focuses on non-punitive measures to encourage compliance before proceeding to measures like the issuing of orders to remedy contraventions and administrative monetary penalties.

Remember:

- Penalties will not apply to individuals in their personal lives or in their homes.
- Education and awareness raising comes first. As a starting point, the Accessibility Compliance Secretariat works with organizations to bring them into compliance by providing tools and resources and feedback. Penalties are the last resort of the compliance framework, reserved for organizations that demonstrate willful or deliberate noncompliance. RIPPLES OF GOODNESS

Building Confidence, Connection, and Care at the Winnipeg Airport Authority

At Winnipeg Airports Authority, our front-line employees are often the first point of contact for passengers who may be feeling overwhelmed, uncertain, or physically fatigued especially older adults navigating a fast-paced, security-driven environment. When we introduced [MASC's training video](#) to our customer service teams, we hoped it would spark empathy and practical understanding. What we witnessed was something even more meaningful.

The video quickly became more than a training tool. It created space for reflection and conversation, helping employees see aging not as a barrier, but as an important part of human diversity. For many, it clarified how simple, thoughtful actions like slowing their pace, adjusting communication, or offering a steady arm can dramatically improve someone's travel experience.

What we heard from employees was a real sense of growing confidence. The video helped demystify aging by breaking it down into clear, relatable scenarios. Staff shared that it reduced the fear of "doing the wrong thing" and replaced it with a more instinctive, compassionate approach. We also saw a shift from checklist thinking to genuine human connection, encouraging employees to focus less on tasks and more on the person in front of them.

Since sharing the video, we've already observed more intentional communication, more patience in lines, and more awareness around mobility changes, cognitive fatigue, and sensory needs. These may seem like small shifts, but together they create a ripple effect. When one employee changes their approach, it influences the team around them and every passenger who moves through our terminal feels the impact.

The true value of MASC's video is this: it strengthened our culture of care.

It reminded us that accessibility is not just about removing barriers, but about treating every traveler with dignity, empathy, and respect.

As we move into 2026, we will continue using this video and work with our Front of House employees to further reinforce the key messages it highlights especially strong customer service, presence, and everyday dignity.

Toolkit Supporting Manitoba Municipalities to Address Anti-Government Hate and Harassment

On December 10, the AMM and Strong Cities Network unveiled a new Toolkit Supporting Manitoba Municipalities to Address Anti-Government Hate and Harassment. The Toolkit includes **130 actionable recommendations** organized into thematic sections, with dedicated guidance for elected officials and municipal staff on topics such as online harassment, misinformation, meeting disruptions, identity-based hate, and protecting candidates for local office. This toolkit comes at a critical time when local elected officials and municipal staff in Manitoba and across Canada are facing increased incivility, hate and harassment.

With municipal elections approaching in 2026, the need for practical tools to support and protect council members, candidates, and municipal staff has never been more urgent. We encourage all members to read the helpful toolkit and practical recommendations for mayors, reeves, councillors, chief administrative officers, city managers, department directors, and other local elected officials and staff.

The Accessibility for Manitobans Act (AMA) Update

On December 4, the Province of Manitoba published draft regulations on orders and administrative penalties under [The Accessibility for Manitobans Act](#) on the provincial government's "proposed regulation" [website](#).

While the AMM has long supported advancing accessibility in Manitoba communities, introducing punitive measures without adequate capacity-building supports first is concerning. Municipalities need education, resources, funding, and collaboration to improve accessibility – not penalties before guidance. Public consultations are now open, and we encourage you to share your feedback alongside the AMM. The deadline to submit comments is **February 2, 2026**.

The Province will also open the **Manitoba Accessibility Fund** Intake from **January 12 – February 20, 2026**. Municipalities can apply for grants of up to **\$50,000** to support accessibility projects. A webinar will also be hosted to guide applicants.

Provincial Program Intakes Now Open

At the AMM Fall Convention, the **Hon. Glen Simard**, Minister of Municipal and Northern Relations, announced that the Manitoba government is inviting organizations to apply to the **From the Ground Up and Urban/Hometown Green Team Programs**.

The AMM welcomes the provincial decision to open these programs earlier than last year, a clear response to our advocacy and the feedback municipalities have provided on the importance of accelerating program timelines. Earlier openings not only help municipalities plan budgets with greater certainty but also allows for shovels to be potentially in the ground sooner to maximize Manitoba's short construction season.

We encourage all municipalities to take advantage of these programs. The application deadline for both programs is **Monday, January 26, 2026**.

Bail Reform Update

On October 23, the **Hon. Sean Fraser**, Minister of Justice and Attorney General of Canada, announced the introduction of the *Bail and Sentencing Reform Act*.

With Manitoba continuing to face some of the highest rates of violent crime in Canada, the AMM and municipalities have consistently called for stronger bail reform measures to improve community safety. The AMM is closely monitoring this legislation, as it plays an important role in ensuring repeat prolific offenders are held accountable. We will continue advocating for a federal approach that strengthens public safety and addresses everyday crime in our communities. As noted in the Government of Canada news release, changes to the *Criminal Code* will only be effective if provincial and territorial governments actively support their implementation. Accordingly, we will continue to call on the Province of Manitoba to promptly implement corresponding provincial measures once federal bail reform legislation is enacted.

We also encourage municipalities to strengthen our collective voice by advocating to local MPs and MLAs for swift action, helping to ensure this proposed legislation translates into safer communities for all Manitobans.

Hello,

The Federal Plastics Registry (the Registry) is a critical tool for improving the understanding of plastic production, use, and management in Canada. This foundational, world-leading data inventory makes data from across the plastics lifecycle open and available to Canadians. It supports the Government of Canada's ongoing commitment to ambitious, evidence-based action to protect Canada's environment by reducing plastic waste and preventing pollution.

Environment and Climate Change Canada (ECCC) has received valuable feedback about the challenges and complexity of reporting for Phases 2 and 3 of the Registry. In response, and in the interests of efficiency, responsiveness, and building a system that works better for everyone, **all reporting requirements for Phases 2 and 3 of the Registry will be delayed.**

Delaying Phases 2 and 3 will allow for streamlining and optimizing reporting requirements. It will also give organizations more time to collect and report high-quality and consistent data. ECCC plans to amend the existing Notice for calendar years 2024, 2025 and 2026 to reflect the delay.

Organizations must continue to report Phase 1 data for the 2024, 2025, and 2026 calendar years, as outlined in the Notice with respect to reporting of plastic resins and certain plastic products for the Federal Plastics Registry for 2024, 2025 and 2026. This means that producers of packaging, electronics and electrical equipment and single-use and disposable plastics destined for the residential waste stream must continue to report.

A new Notice will be published in the *Canada Gazette* in Summer 2026 to establish reporting requirements for the 2027, 2028, and 2029 calendar years. In advance of this, ECCC plans to publish a Notice of Intent in the *Canada Gazette* in Winter 2026 to further communicate its intentions to delay Phases 2 and 3.

Stakeholders will also have several opportunities to engage with ECCC in 2026 and provide their feedback on changes to the Registry. Additional information on how and when engagement will occur will be shared in the coming months.

Le report des phases 2 et 3 permettra de rationaliser et d'optimiser les exigences en matière de déclaration. Il donnera également aux organisations plus de temps pour collecter et déclarer des données cohérentes et de haute qualité. L'ECCC prévoit de modifier l'avis existant pour les années civiles 2024, 2025 et 2026 afin de refléter ce délai.

Les organisations doivent continuer à déclarer les données de la phase 1 pour les années civiles 2024, 2025 et 2026, comme indiqué dans [l'Avis relatif à la déclaration des résines plastiques et de certains produits en plastique pour le registre fédéral sur les plastiques pour 2024, 2025 et 2026](#). Cela signifie que les producteurs d'emballages, d'équipements électroniques et électriques et de plastiques à usage unique et jetables destinés au flux de déchets résidentiels doivent continuer à déclarer.

Les intervenants auront également plusieurs occasions de collaborer avec l'ECCC en 2026 et de faire part de leurs commentaires sur les changements apportés au Registre. De plus amples informations sur la manière et le moment où cette collaboration aura lieu seront communiquées dans les mois à venir.

FCM ensures municipal input on design of new Build Communities Strong Fund



These recommendations were expressed via a letter to ministers' offices, an in-person meeting between our CEO and President and Minister of Infrastructure and Housing Gregor Robertson, and in roundtable meetings between our Municipal Finance, Infrastructure and Transportation committee and parliamentary secretaries McKelvie and Desrochers—ensuring the federal government hears municipalities loud and clear on this crucial program's design. Amendments to the Vessel Operation Restriction Regulations

In August, Transport Canada announced changes to the Vessel Operation Restriction Regulations that will provide local authorities with a faster and more efficient process to manage issues like excessive speed and shoreline erosion in their communities. By modernizing the process, local authorities will be better equipped to respond quickly to safety and environmental issues on their waterways.

Local authorities must submit complete applications to Transport Canada by mid-November of each year to have restrictions in place before the next boating season. Applications can be submitted at any time and will be reviewed upon receipt.





Phasing out fossil fuels in community housing

An Edmonton housing co-operative has taken bold steps to modernize its townhouse complex, which was built in the late 1970s. Through a member-led process, the co-op committed to a deep energy retrofit with improved insulation, new windows and doors and upgraded roofing and ventilation systems with full electrification and rooftop solar panels.

The result is a community that has eliminated natural gas use and reduced energy consumption by up to 84 percent, which could translate to as much as \$100,000 in combined annual savings.

Strengthening Canada's Arctic Gateway

Canada's Arctic transportation corridor is undergoing a period of significant renewal and strategic growth. The Port of Churchill and Hudson Bay Railway (HBR) continue to play a critical role in strengthening northern supply chains, supporting Indigenous-led ownership, and reinforcing Canada's Arctic presence.

This update highlights recent investments, operational progress, and emerging opportunities that matter to our members and partners.

Canada's Arctic Trade Advantage

The Port of Churchill remains Canada's only deep-water Arctic port, providing a unique maritime gateway to global markets. With four operational berths and direct rail connectivity, the port serves as a vital link between northern resources and international trade routes.

The Hudson Bay Railway provides year-round surface access to northern Manitoba, supporting both commercial activity and the delivery of essential goods to remote communities.

Ownership of these assets is proudly held by Arctic Gateway Group (AGG) on behalf of First Nations and northern municipalities, representing a nationally significant ownership model that unlocks unprecedented opportunities for global market access.

HUDSON BAY ROUTE ASSOCIATION

Over the past two years, substantial investments have been made to modernize and stabilize northern transportation infrastructure:

- More than 2.3 million feet of rail spot surfacing completed (2024–2025)
- 119,965 new rail ties installed, exceeding 2023 totals
- 1,600+ ballast railcars unloaded to improve track integrity
- Rail travel time reduced by approximately three hours between The Pas and Churchill

These upgrades directly improve reliability, safety, and service efficiency for shippers, communities, and industry partners.

STRONG FEDERAL SUPPORT

March 2025, the federal government announced \$175 million in funding to support long-term sustainability:

- \$125 million for operations and maintenance
- \$50 million for port pre-development

This builds on an additional \$80 million invested in 2024, reflecting strong government confidence in the strategic importance of Canada's Arctic gateway.

GROWTH OPPORTUNITIES

The Port of Churchill and HBR are well-positioned for future expansion across multiple sectors, including:

- Mining and critical minerals
- Agriculture and fertilizer exports and imports
- Energy and bulk commodities
- Arctic and sub-Arctic maritime services

Federal-provincial collaboration continues to expand Manitoba's role in Arctic and global trade networks.

COMMUNITY IMPACT & NORTHERN RESILIENCE

Beyond trade, the Hudson Bay Railway plays a crucial role in daily life across northern Manitoba. The rail line delivers fuel, groceries, construction materials, and essential goods to remote and Indigenous communities that rely on consistent access.


Investments in rail and port infrastructure support economic reconciliation and Indigenous leadership, improve affordability and reliability of northern supply chains, strengthen Canada's Arctic sovereignty and national resilience.

LOOKING FORWARD

As global interest in Arctic routes and northern resources grows, the Port of Churchill and Hudson Bay Railway stand at the center of Canada's northern strategy. Continued investment, collaboration, and member engagement will be key to unlocking this corridor's full potential.

We thank our members and partners for their ongoing support as we build a stronger, more resilient Arctic gateway for Canada.





WHAT YOUR MEMBERSHIP MADE POSSIBLE

Your support enabled high-level government engagement, strategic planning, and concrete actions to strengthen the Port of Churchill and northern economic development. We worked directly with Transport Canada to secure extended icebreaker service for both incoming and outgoing vessels, improving reliability and extending the operating season. We also hosted our Annual General Meeting in Thompson, Manitoba, highlighting northern mining prospects and regional development opportunities, with our next AGM planned for Prince Albert to expand Prairie and industry outreach.



In 2024, Manitoba Transportation and Infrastructure (MTI) launched the 2024/2025 Multi-year Infrastructure Investment Strategy, outlining five years of infrastructure projects prioritized in accordance with various department initiatives. Since the strategy was launched, MTI has made significant progress on advancing many of the projects and achieving key objectives.

As the department reacts to changing needs in the province, MTI understands the need to adapt its strategy and communicate these changes. That's why I am pleased to share with you an update to the department's five-year plan. MTI's update to the multi-year strategy includes many more exciting projects that support the department's key initiatives such as the Trade and Commerce Grid Initiative, the Perimeter Freeway Initiative and the Enhancing National Trade Corridors Strategy.
